THE CARPENTER COUNTY DIVISION BILL.

The RECORD-UNION, in line with its uniform advocacy of local self-government, has expressed the opinion that county division questions should be taken out of the Legislature by a general provision relegating all such issues to the decision of the people immediately concerned.

It is not necessary to present the several details of the bill. They are plain and explicit, and there is no ambiguity in them. The ascertainment of the judgment of the people is to be had by an election held as early as possible.

There are, perhaps, some improvements to be named for the betterment of the measure, but they are such as will naturally suggest themselves to the Legislature. The central thought and underlying principles of the bill are sound, since it provides for the whole body of the county being made the arbiter of the question of division, and that is the only tribunal which should sit in the case.

The reasons for submission of the question to the people are general, and such as we have set forth heretofore; but it will occur to the thoughtful that a special reason is this, that in all such questions there are many considerations purely local, which address themselves forcibly to all the people of the county, but which a Legislature is incapable of appreciating fully, and of which it cannot gain a clear idea by any amount of testimony submitted to it.

MR. E. J. CROLY SEEMS TO BE CON- siderably worked up over some imaginary "injury" and "disrespect" which he has been "offended" by. He is, however, a responsible man, and his action in rejecting Mr. Croly's bid is, under the circumstances, a forced issue, emphasized by a majority vote, and Mr. Croly will remember, he, in language more emphatic than polite, called upon and de- manded that the doors be kept open on one side and the four Association members on the other. The identical words used by me in reply were that Mr. Croly's bid should have to bite off the biggest end, in order to have competition on that side, and there- fore reject your bid. There is no slur upon your performance in the transaction of business in my office, the doors were kept open, such and all other things, and I believe there were enough spectators present who will bear witness that Mr. Croly's bid was treated with more courtesy at my hands than that gentle- man is capable of dispensing when in his best humor.

I can readily understand that it is not a difficult matter for a man who is not a native born citizen, and that some of the bidders could scarcely speak English intelligently, and he does not feel that they are native born citizens. This may be a misfortune, but the association does not native born. And there are men- bers who are almost equal to Mr. Croly him- self, who have a very intelligent knowledge of the English language. It is worthy of note that if membership was confined to native born citizens, Mr. Croly would be ineligible, as it appears by the Great Register of this county that he was born in Canada, and was made a citizen in this county in 1877.

It appears from the concluding remarks of Mr. Croly's interview that he does not object to the association, but objects to Mr. Croly's bid being boycotted because of irresponsibility. Now, it is clearly and definitely stated that Mr. Croly's bid was not rejected on account of irresponsibility. It is, therefore, difficult to see what his real cause of complaint is.
