

LEGISLATURE—29TH SESSION.

Only One Senate Vote Cast Against Ballot Reform.

The Glenn County Bill Passes Both Branches—Privileged Bills Now Hold the Boards.

SENATE.

SACRAMENTO, Thursday, Feb. 26, 1891. The Senate met at 10 o'clock a. m., Lieutenant-Governor Reddick in the chair. Roll called, and quorum present. Prayer by the Chaplain. Reading of the Journal dispensed with. On motion of Mr. Streeter, A. B. 353 (creating the county of San Jacinto), the special order for 10 a. m., was made the special order for the same hour on Friday. Mr. Dray moved that, under the privileged rule, to call up bills as cases of urgency, the roll be called, and that each Senator in his turn be allowed to call up but one bill. Bills were then called up, placed upon the urgency file (which operation consumed just one hour), and considered in the following order: S. B. 506, relating to the disabilities of married women to act as executors, administrators or guardians. Passed. S. B. 497, relating to liens of mechanics and others. Amended and ordered reprinted. S. B. 44, making an appropriation of \$25,000 for certain repairs and improvements at the Folsom Prison, gave rise to some debate. Messrs. Voorhies, Banks and Preston were heard in support of the bill to the Public Buildings and Finance Committee, which was opposed by Messrs. Dray, Berry and Mead. A motion to so refer the bill was carried, and, on motion of Mr. Dray, the committee were instructed to report it back on Friday. S. B. 589, providing for the appointment of Health and Market Inspectors in cities of 50,000 population and over. Amended so as to apply to cities of the first-class, and passed. When A. B. 185, creating the County of Glenn, was reached, several Senators expressed a desire to have it passed temporarily. Mr. Campbell of Solano contended that it had been rung in surreptitiously, the understanding being that only Senate bills should be considered. After some wrangling over the question of recommending the bill to the file, its reading was proceeded with. When the second reading was completed, at noon hour was reached, and the Senate took a recess. Afternoon Session. The Senate reassembled at 2 o'clock p. m., and resumed consideration of the Glenn County bill. Mr. Dray moved that the question as to the third reading of the bill be made the special order for Friday morning. Lost. Mr. Fraser moved to make the bill the special order for 3:30 p. m., on Friday. Lost. The bill was then read the third time, and passed—ayes 25, nays 11. Mr. Ostrom changed his vote from no to aye, and gave notice of a motion to reconsider. S. B. 674, to authorize payment for certain services rendered by Justices of the Peace in counties of the tenth class (of interest to Solano county). Passed. S. B. 599, relating to the working, rights of way and drainage of mines. Passed. A. B. 192, for the protection of lands from overflow of innavigable streams. Passed. BALLOT REFORM. The special order at 3:30 p. m. was the substitute for S. B. 37, 123 and 369—the ballot reform bill. It was read the third time and the roll-called ordered on its passage. When the name of G. J. Campbell of Solano county was called, he made a vehement speech against the bill. The bill was passed—ayes 33, nays 1 (Campbell of Solano).

This was opposed by Messrs. Ostrom and Mead, who held that the urgency resolution, under which Senate bills were taken up in the morning, was still the order of business. The Chair ruled otherwise, and the special Assembly file was taken up and the following bills passed: A. B. 23, relating to the manner of taking depositions out of the State. A. B. 54, relating to the service of summonses in actions in Justice Courts. A. B. 56, relating to actions in divorce cases. A. B. 58, relating to fines and imprisonment. A. B. 66, authorizing incorporated cities to acquire water reservoirs, rights of way, etc. A. B. 101, relating to the redemption of land sold at tax sale. Amended and ordered reprinted. A. B. 129, making it a misdemeanor to refuse to obtain a divorce, or to aid therein. A. B. 20, to amend Section 408 of the Code of Civil Procedure. Lost. A. B. 214, 215 and 68, to amend the Act to provide for the organization, incorporation and government of municipal corporations. A. B. 24, concerning the costs in civil actions for serving summonses and subpoenas. Amended and ordered reprinted. A. B. 418, to pay the deficiency in the appropriation for repairs for the State Capitol building and furniture for the forty-first fiscal year. FOR THE INSTITUTE. At 10 o'clock p. m. Mr. Mahoney called up the special order, S. B. 639, to provide for the employment of destitute citizens, and making appropriations therefor. A. B. 418, to pay the deficiency in the appropriation for repairs for the State Capitol building and furniture for the forty-first fiscal year. ASSEMBLY. The House assembled at 10 o'clock a. m., Speaker pro tem. in the chair. Roll called and quorum present. Prayer by the Chaplain. Reading of the Journal dispensed with. forces to grant the members yearly vacations. The bill was ordered at once transmitted to the Senate. The Assembly Conference Committee, Mr. Shanhahn moved to strike out the enacting clause, and, in support of his motion, said that the clause "with rooms about without any lawful business" might be made to work great injustice to miners, lumbermen and farm laborers who were obliged to go from place to place for work. He believed it was against the principles of the State Constitution. Messrs. Doty, Cunningham, Clark and Dennis supported the motion to strike out the enacting clause, and the bill was passed by a vote of ayes 39, nays 33. On motion of Mr. Bruner the vote by which the bill was passed was reconsidered, amended so as to suit the wishes of the country members regarding the sale of drugs and compounding of simple medicines, ordered engrossed to third reading. Mr. Lowe's bill, 696, amending the city charter of San Jose, was read the second time.

SENATE MESSAGE. A message from the Senate was read announcing that the "reform ballot" bill had passed that body.

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AN AMATEUR VIDOQO. George Runyon Runs His Despoilers to Earth.

Several weeks ago George Runyon, of Courtland, who is well-known in this city, went to San Francisco to visit friends. One night he happened to stroll into the "South-of-Market" district, and was way-laid by three foot-pads who relieved him of his money and a valuable diamond scarf pin.

The robbery was reported to the San Francisco police, but no clue was found to the robbers. Mr. Runyon then went to San Jose. He had not walked up and down the boulevards for over ten minutes before he spied his lost diamond pin in the hands of a young man who was one of San Jose's leading promiscuaries. Instead of reclaiming the pin by force of arms, Mr. Runyon displayed his accuser by quietly taking the first train to San Francisco and acquainting the detectives with his discovery.

Detective Rogers accompanied him back to San Jose and had no trouble in finding the wearer of the pin. A few words between the detective and the pin-wearer disclosed the fact that the latter's name was Jordan, and he specifically convinced both the officer and Runyon that he had bought it in good faith for \$15 from James McNamara, better known as "Jumbo." McNamara was arrested by Rogers. Runyon identified McNamara as one of the three men who stood him up and robbed him, and a charge of robbery was accordingly placed against him.
