A MATTER OF HOSPITALS. The Board of Supervisors has resolved to make a necessary addition to the County Hospital and Almshouse.

The addition is needed is not gained; especially in the winter season, when the hospital fills up, is there demand for more room. It is not, therefore, intended to antagonize that proposition when we say that there is a more immediate need that should be first responded to, since the Supervisors declare that they cannot afford to erect both structures in the same year.

SUCCESS FOR BALLOT REFORM ASSURED.

The opponents of the ballot reform bill have withdrawn their opposition to the passage of the Senate bill, but without their leader abandoning his steadfast and consistent position against the measure. But yesterday consented that the bill shall go back to the Senate at once with three slight amendments, to which the friends of the bill in turn consented.

It is now to be taken as a certainty that the measure will become a law within the next few days, for we do not consider the slight hitches concerning the amendments as at all serious. The amendments adopted are, that petition-nominations shall be made upon the basis of five per cent. of the voters; that Presidential Elector nominees shall be so grouped that a voter can vote for party groups with one marking or stamping, and that the clause allowing petition-nominations on the application of one thousand voters, where the office to be filled is a State office, be stricken out, leaving the five per cent. to apply to such nominations.

The Senate has sent the bill to a conference committee, on the statement of a Senator that he had heard that the Attorney-General deemed one of the amendments fatal to the San Francisco registration system.


