THE FIELD FOR A STATE BOARD OF CHARITY AND CORRECTION.

That the greatest of charities is that which enables the poor to help themselves, was clearly shown by Miss Lowell in her notable monograph upon private charity and public relief.

Now, it is clear that mere giving of alms to these would tend the more to pauperize them, to destroy their self-helpfulness, to educate them to lean upon others.

At this point the work of associated charity organizations begins. By association and the establishment of a central office from which they all radiate, they can ascertain exactly what paupers, if any, are drawing assistance from more than one association.

William M. Salter in his late treatise on the subject says that the Massachusetts Labor Bureau reported in 1887 that about a third of those engaged in remunerative labor in that State were unemployed at their principal occupation for about one-third of the time.

The establishment of a State Board of Charities and Correction would tend to greatly inform us concerning all conditions of the poor in California.

The vindication of Superior Judge Catlin, first by the people of his county, next at the hands of the Assembly, next by the Supreme Court, was precisely the outcome of justice.

Through such a board we could ascertain the relations of all the charities to each other, the cost and causes of crime, the extent of imposition, and the leaks through which charity appropriations by the State go to waste.

But while the State Board would not operate directly in all the lines of activity to which we have referred, it must be borne in mind that its creation would have a tendency to stimulate the association of charity organizations through

which all the avenues of information desirable can be occupied. Such a board would be a powerful agency in clearing the way for light upon all questions relating to the unemployed; it would, therefore, be auxiliary to labor bureaus throughout the United States.

We have not, in these considerations, taken into account the immense field of usefulness open to such a board as is proposed by a bill now pending in the Legislature; examination, methodically and exhaustively, into the causes and cost of crime, the prevention of discharged prisoners drifting back into the criminal class, and the means employed to reclaim and reform.

THERE are, according to the statistics of the Book Buyer for March, some satisfactory facts concerning the books issued to the people. The popular idea is that the taste of the people is rapidly and steadily augmenting the demand for works of fiction.

Mr. Huntington also dwells with an impressive earnestness upon what the building of these roads has done for the country, far exceeding in its consequences that the builders have realized for themselves, and upon the further fact, as entitling them to additional consideration, that their ability to compete with the Canadian Pacific has been practically destroyed by the operations of the Interstate Commerce Act.

The Pacific Funding Bill. The Washington Post, in publishing the letter of C. P. Huntington, which appears elsewhere in this issue, makes editorial comment upon the subject of the Pacific funding bill, as treated by Mr. Huntington, which we quote in full:

Why the Government cannot, with advantage to its owner or the public interest, or with justice to the corporations concerned, proceed to foreclose its claims upon the Pacific roads; and why it should, in view of past and present circumstances grant to these great overland lines the extension of indebtedness which they ask, are set forth with great argumentative force in a letter addressed to Congress by Mr. C. P. Huntington, and published in the Post this morning.

No man in the country is better qualified than Mr. Huntington to speak intelligently upon this question. His comprehensive knowledge of railway affairs, covering a period of many years; his intimate relations to the Central Pacific from the very outset of its construction; his familiarity with its history and progress, and existing conditions enable him to state, as it were, with authority, what legislation is most essential to tide them over their obligations to the Government, and at the same time render them of the most valuable service of the country.

He shows very clearly that the Government will gain nothing by the adoption of extreme measures; that the Pacific roads ask nothing which is unreasonable or extraordinary; that it is the common experience of railroads to pay bonds on maturity by the issue of other bonds, and that the Government will not only get back all its advances at the end of that time, but at a large rate of interest that it would have to pay if it went into the market to borrow.
