

NEW LAWS.

Bills Which Have Been Approved by the Governor.

Also, Measures Passed by the Legislature Now Awaiting the Signature of the Executive.

The following is a complete index to the laws passed by the late Legislature and approved by the Governor up to midnight Wednesday, March 25th. Acts in the hands of the Governor appear below. The number is the chapter of the laws as recorded in the office of the Secretary of State. Pol. C., Pen. C., C. P. and C.
