The Seized Steamer Seward.

WASHINGTON, April 2.—Attorney-General Miller to-day formally filed in the Supreme Court of the United States the return made by Judge Bugbee of the Sitka (Alaska) District Court to the writ of the Supreme Court, asking that cause should be removed to the District Court of Alaska for full jurisdiction. An exception will probably be taken to the return, because it does not contain evidence brought out before the Sitka Court.

In Judge Catlin's court yesterday Christian Brendt, a native of Germany, was admitted to citizenship on the testimony of the District Court of Oregon.

While fishing near the mouth of Burner Slough on Wednesday a couple of fishermen claimed to have captured a large salmon, which they brought to the city. It was followed by an urgent appeal by many interested between Dumas and Capistrano insisting that between these points there were locations equally as desirable for a harbor. It resulted in providing for a commission to make a general investigation. It was expected that the report, which would concern all points of alleged natural facilities and inducements for a deep harbor, would be submitted to the department just as the report on the Redondo harbor will be received within a very few days.

The Redondo report and general report will be considered by General Casey, and he will make a recommendation to the Secretary of War, giving, in his judgment, the best point at which to locate the harbor. This will be submitted to Congress by the Secretary of War.

The Secretary has been solicited by many to see the report as soon as it reaches him, and similar requests have reached General Casey. The latter says that it is not in his power to give out any information about the matter, and the former contends that the report should be made public.

It has been informed, however, Southern California real estate men are circulating rumors about the matter. They have a harbor located in many places to suit their investments.

The Secretary expressed the hope today that no one would believe the reports, for it is quite certain that the large scale in his office could contain the secret until it was made public to all alike. He added, however, that it would be time to consider the question of making the whole matter public after all the reports had been received.

THE PRESIDENT'S TRIP.

Schedule of Cities to be Visited in Case He Comes West.

WASHINGTON, April 2.—The statement by the President's Secretary in regard to the contemplated trip says that the President is not fully determined but the President's final decision, has appointed a provisional schedule. Unless matters intervene to prevent, the party will leave here April 14th and travel southward.

The following cities will be briefly visited: Reno, Chattanooga, Atlanta, Birmingham, Memphis, Little Rock, Dallas, reaching Galveston Saturday night.

They leave Galveston Monday morning and go to El Paso, Yuma and Los Angeles, California will be entered about Tuesday or Wednesday of the second week. California will take about a week's time, a short tour being made through the State. From San Francisco the party will go to Portland, Olympia and Puget Sound.

They will turn home west, taking in Boise City, Ogden, Salt Lake, Pueblo, Denver, Hastings, Omaha, Moberly, Springfield and Indianapolis, reaching Sunday, May 10th, there. From Indianapolis they will come back to Washington.

THE ALERT.

Reports Concerning Her Seaworthiness Likely to Result in a Court-Martial.

NEW YORK, April 2.—A Tribune Washington special says: The papers in the court of inquiry on the Alert have been verified and are awaiting the action of the Secretary of the Navy. It is generally felt at the department that culpability exists somewhere for the condition of the Alert, or for her retention at Mare Island, Cal., when she had been ordered to sea.

The court did not fix this culpability, beyond stating the facts and describing the conditions which produced the calamity. The court also stated that the conditions diametrically opposed findings, from as many boards of survey on the vessel.

One board reported repairs to cost six hundred dollars, while the second board found the ship in need of repairs to cost ten times that amount. The commanding officer asserted the seaworthiness of the vessel, basing his opinion presumably on the observation of the engineers and the constructor.

It is intimated at the department that a court-martial is likely, but opinions differ regarding the official to be tried. If the ship is in need of repairs to cost six hundred dollars, the commanding officer will be made the object of trial. If the vessel is unseaworthy, the constructor would be tried. The decision rests with the Secretary.

COAST-DEFENSE GUNS.

Those for the San Francisco Harbor Being Constructed.

WASHINGTON, April 2.—General Casey received a report to-day from the company having the contract to construct the six high-power guns to be mounted in the harbor of San Francisco. He says the work is starting out very successfully, and he says he is in position to defend the harbor by the first of July, 1888.

He thought the San Francisco people might become somewhat impatient, but he observed that it took time to make guns of any value for coast-defense. They will be eight and ten-inch guns in weight, thirty caliber, and will weigh a half seven miles, and will deflect and accuracy two and three miles.
