

MONITORS AT WORK.

Anti-Debris Agents Make a Tour of the Hydraulic Region.

NEGLIGENCE AT MARE ISLAND.

THE BOARD OF INQUIRY ON THE ALERT SCANDAL.

Constructor Feaster and Others of the Navy Yard Officers Dismissed From the Service.

WASHINGTON, April 8.—About six months ago repairs were completed upon the United States steamer Alert, at Mare Island Navy Yard, and the vessel was put in commission—which means that she received a full complement of officers and men, and was ready to go to sea.

It was reported that the repairs were so substantial in character that it would be dangerous for the vessel to go to sea. On the other hand, there were disagreeable rumors that certain officers did not want to sail in the vessel, as they preferred the newer cruisers and were trying to cause a seaway vessel to be condemned. Boards and surveys were ordered, and their reports indicated that the repairs had been scamped; that the inner skin of the vessel had not been properly renewed; that serious defects in it had been covered up, and that the boilers were liable to sink through.

This state of affairs led the department to order an investigation on the following lines: Has there been any neglect of duty or carelessness on the part of any officer of the navy or employe of the Navy Yard at Mare Island in preparing the Alert for sea? If so, state the name or names of such officer or officers, or employe or employes, and the particulars of carelessness in each case.

The Board of Inquiry made a report which was made public to-day. The board declares that Naval Constructor Feaster has been careless in the supervision of the repairs, and negligent in the examination of the work as it progressed, which resulted in serious defects in the ship being passed without repairs, and in unsatisfactory workmanship in the repairs made.

A board composed of Commodore Irwin, Commander Bartlett, Assistant Constructor and Chief Engineer, has been ordered to survey the Alert again, and report what repairs are necessary, while Constructor Fernald has been ordered to assume charge of the repairs.

FARMERS' ALLIANCE. The Executive Committee in Mississippi Encounters a Stumbling Block. JACKSON (Miss.), April 8.—The Executive Committee of the State Farmers' Alliance met last night to consider the question of accepting the resignation of their newspaper organ. The sole difference was on the subject of a question, but as the State and National Alliance declared in favor of the majority plan, it is the sense of the majority of the committee that all members of the Alliance should stand by the said declaration.

Refuse to Accept Silver Certificates. New York, April 8.—A Boston special says: The Government is remitting the money refunded to the States under the direct tax law in old silver certificates issued under the Hamilton two-cent dollar Act. The State of Maine's \$24,000 came here last night, and part of it was offered in the settlement of balances at the Clearing House yesterday. The banks have a verbal understanding to use silver in the settlement of balances, but the Act of 1882 provides that no banking association shall receive these certificates. Hence fears of bringing the banks to a silver basis are current. The matter has caused much discussion, and the outcome is watched with interest.

They Will Be Ejected. MOUNT PLEASANT (Penn.), April 8.—The situation in the coke districts is devoid of excitement. Notices of ejectment were placed in the hands of Constables to-day. Ten days' notice to quit was served to-morrow on the strikers who are occupying the company's houses. Every one who will not work will be forced to seek a residence elsewhere. Thirty more men were given work at Morewood to-day.

A Policeman Killed by a Negro. BIRMINGHAM (Ala.), April 7.—At Blockton, Bibb County, last night, Marshal Anderson and policeman Wood made a raid on a negro dive. Wood was shot and instantly killed. Anderson shot and fatally wounded Jake Smith, one of the negro gamblers. The other negroes escaped.

Death of General Garret. ATLANTA (Ga.), April 7.—General Lucius J. Garret died here to-night. He was at one time a member of the United States Congress, and also of the Confederate Congress.
