DECAY OF THE FREE COINAGE IDEA.

There are many evidences that the free coinage cry is dying out; that it is not likely to be strengthened, and that the silver mania will not again become a prominent feature in Congress.

As significant of the changing sentiment referred to, it is noted that Senator Power of Montana has come out against free coinage. Though esteemed a strong silver advocate, he declares that he is now convinced absolute free coinage by a sudden jump to it by legislation, would be a great mistake.

The wisest politicians all over the country are saying that neither of the great parties can now go before the country with a free-coinage plank in its platform and hope for success with any shadow of reason.

stitutional lawyer distinctly, and with emphasis, declared that for violence committed upon an alien by a mob, his Government could rightfully pursue only the local authority, and that the United States would not confess liability for that which it could not prevent, and which it did not assume to have the right to prevent in the presence of duly invested local authority.

About ten years ago some Englishmen were mobbed in the State of Texas, and England preferred a claim for reparation against the United States, but the President directed a reply to be made that the violence took place in a sovereign State, and that the State alone, or its subordinate authorities, towns and cities, could respond in damages.

So that we have here four important and distinct cases in which our Government has denied liability to pay indemnity. It is likely that when Marquis di Rudini comes before King Humbert's other Cabinet officers, with Mr. Blaine's letter, that he will forward this week, in which the settled policy of the American nation will be asserted, the Italian Secretary will examine the law and precedents, and withdraw his claim against the United States.

FRANCE proposes to place at the capital of all considerable nations an official whose sole duty will be to study the condition of the people industrially and commercially and to report upon their methods. This is very significant; it indicates that the French Republic is not content with political representatives, but proposes to study all peoples of civilization, in order to avoid their errors and profit by their successes.

A RECENT census bulletin announces the existence of extensive coal deposits in both South and North Dakota. The quality from shallow shaft examples is a fair grade of lignite or brown coal. It is to be hoped that explorations of the veins will develop coal of a thoroughly good order.

The queerest gift on record is that lately made by the lower house of the Nebraska Legislature to the Speaker. It was a cork arm. Why, however, should we consider it odd? It was intended to make the Speaker even. It was of more value to him than a set of silver spoons, or an ornamental vase, or engrossed resolutions.
