OUR INTEREST IN THE AFRICAN COMPACTS.

Some reference has been made in the press to the "rejection," by the United States Senate of the "General Act," agreed upon by the plenipotentiaries of seventeen powers, assembled in Brussels July, 1880, in reference to the slave-trade in Africa.

There are one hundred articles in the treaty. They set out that to suppress the slave trade African territories should be organized and placed under protectorates of civilizations with established stations at convenient distances to make the repressive action effectively felt.

There are very many minute specifications relative to caravan routes, the slave trade by sea, how it shall be resisted; the use of the flags of the powers and their mutual recognition; the establishment of an international office at Zanzibar, etc.

It will be seen that all the provisions of the compact are beneficial. The United States sees no territory over which it desires to extend a protectorate upon that continent, and its sole interest arises out of its anti-slave trade policy, with which it has labored hand in hand with England upon the African coast for a half a century or more, and out of the fact that it is one of the signatory powers to the establish-

ment of the Congo Free State and to the guaranty of its independence.

Entering into the Brussels compact is not forming an "entangling alliance" with foreign powers, such as it has been our uniform policy to avoid.

There is a separate compact, also, to be passed upon, that was agreed to by Mr. Terrell, our Minister at Brussels, and M. Van Etvelde, of the Congo Free State, recognizing the principle of the establishment of duties on imports in the Free State, and reserving for further negotiation a commercial treaty assuring American commerce the privileges of the most favored nation.

We have now five days in which to make preparations to receive the President in Sacramento. The task of doing so with credit to the city is all the greater because this is to be the end of the feast of receptions.

That the agreement in this matter may be better understood, some sketch of it now will prepare the way for its ratification, we outline the main features. The powers agreeing are the United States, Germany, Austria, Belgium, Denmark, Persia, Portugal, Russia, Sweden and Norway, Turkey and Zanzibar.
