It absurd, un-American and wholly un-
necessary. Being pressed, however, by
the Chief of Police to yield, he did so re-
luctantly, evidently feeling that the

A SINGLE Whitehead torpedo has sunk
the finest Chilean armored war-ship, the
Blanco Encalada. In size she was about
the mate for the iron-clad Boston and
Atlanta, of the United States Navy, and
in resistance was probably a better ship.

The United States is about to engage in
the manufacture of a new kind of torpedoes,
that, it is believed, will prove more
destructive than any yet invented, and
that can be cast to a greater distance. So,
too, we are experimenting with marked
success with submarine torpedo boats
that can make a distance of ten or twelve
miles submerged most of the time, and
explode a torpedo beneath amidships of
a hostile ship, without harm to the assail-
ant. The significance of the case of the
Lynch and the Encalada is therefore very
great, and it is likely that our naval
authorities will dispatch instructions to
have the most exhaustive inquiry made
into all the details of the affair in Caldera
bay.

New York has now an opportunity to
unearth a new rascality. John Sutherland,
proprietor of a chop house, tells the
Times that he has grown tired of bribing
in order to secure a license. He declares
that for a long time he has been unable
to secure a license to do business in that
city, except by bribery. He has had to
salvo official palms, or those of go-be-
tweens for years, sometimes as cheaply as
\$5, at others it has cost him \$25. If he re-
fused, annoyances were such that he paid
to preserve his peace of mind. It is not
at all likely that Sutherland is alone in
his misery—it is probable that there are
thousands who are bled precisely as he is.


