Secretary Foster Figures Up the Cash on Hand.

CHINA'S DISLIKE FOR MINISTER BLAIR FORMALLY STATED.

Utah Indians Refuse to Vacate Their Lands Unless Paid for Their Improvements—School Indemnity Lands—Enlisting Indians in the Army—Republican Success in 1892.

Special to the RECORD-UNION. WASHINGTON, April 29.—In a talk with a reporter to-day about the recent statement of Mint Director Leach on finances, Secretary Foster said that Leach was right in the main, although he (Foster) would have stated it a little differently.

He would say that some of the \$250,000,000 of available cash might be regarded as trust funds. It would be correct to say that about seventy millions is unquestionably available cash—that is, money in banks, subsidiary coin, trade-dollar bullion, current cash and silver against no certificates are issued.

DON'T WANT BLAIR.

The new Minister will not be received in China. WASHINGTON, April 29.—A representative of the Associated Press this morning called at the Chinese Legation here and had an interview with Minister Yen in regard to the reported declaration of his Government to receive Senator Blair as the accredited representative of the United States. Yen said, through an interpreter, that he had received a cablegram from the Chinese Legation in Peking which had been instructed to lay before Secretary Blaine without delay, expressing the unwillingness of the Emperor to receive Blair. Other than this, Yen had received no instructions, written or otherwise, from his Government on the subject.

BLAIR TALKS.

CHICAGO, April 29.—Ex-Senator Blair, the new Minister to China, arrived here this morning and was immediately in regard to the report that the Chinese Government had submitted to the Department of State a formal protest against his being sent to China.

ANOTHER MINISTER.

WASHINGTON, April 29.—Among the departmental officials there is generally a disposition to discuss the subject of Blair's rejection. Still it is evident there is no general desire to magnify the incident into the proportion of a diplomatic rupture.

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UMATILLA LANDS.

WASHINGTON, April 29.—Some days ago the Secretary of the Interior instructed the Receiver of the Land Office at Pendleton, Or., Cleaver, to send all the money received from the sale of improvements by the Indians on the Umatilla lands to the Commissioner of Indian Affairs, who would through an Indian agent refund to the Indians the money due them for their improvements.

Must Vamose.

WASHINGTON, April 29.—In regard to instructions issued sometime ago by the Commissioners of Indian Affairs, ordering the removal of intruders from the Kaskas Nation, it was today stated at the Indian Bureau that these 6,000 people never had a shadow of title or claim to the land they occupy, and as early as July, 1860, were warned to leave the territory before the following November.
