

HARRISON'S VISIT.

The Reception Committee Arranges Further Details.

Only Those Who Have Signified a Willingness to Act Will be Allowed Badges.

Some thirty members of the President Harrison Reception and Invitation Committee held a meeting in the library-room in Pioneer Hall last evening to discuss and settle upon certain matters relating to their duties on Saturday next.

After some discussion, it was agreed that the committee should be promptly on hand at the Capitol on Saturday morning to receive the President and his party, whether they will be escorted by the military and Grand Army of the Republic.

It was announced that the duties proper of the military escort would depend on the arrival of the procession at the front gate leading to Capitol Park, but that, at the request of the Executive Committee, the military would form lines about the platform occupied by the Presidential party, in order that the children may pass in review before the President.

On motion of R. M. Clark, Senator Dray was chosen marshal of the civil portion of the procession. His duties will include the seating of the President and his party, and the proper disposition of members of the various committees.

It was voted that the members of the committee entitled to active participation in the economy of reception will be designated by suitable badges.

J. O. Coleman thought that only those who manifested sufficient interest in the matter to be present last evening should be entitled to badges.

Mr. Gardner said that would be hardly just to members of the committee who were unable to be present. He knew of several that were absent from the city.

Mr. Coleman then moved that only those present and such as had expressed a willingness to be present should be entitled to badges, and the names of the following members of the committee were announced by the Secretary: W. On motion of George W. Ficks, Hon. W. C. Hendricks was selected for assistant marshal at the reception within the park.

Mr. Carrington moved that just enough badges be printed to supply the number, and that they be distributed by the Marshal.

Mr. Dray said he feared that this course was going to cause more or less trouble. The names of a large number of citizens had been published as members of the Invitation and Reception Committee, and it only those present at the meeting were to constitute the committee, the persons shut out would feel that they had been unjustly treated.

Mr. Clark took a different view of the matter. He thought that if gentlemen who had been appointed on the committee had not seen fit to act, it should be assumed that they did not wish to.

Mr. Dray replied that there should be a few more badges prepared than the names of those present. He preferred that the badges be distributed by the Mayor.

After some further discussion, the motion made by Mr. Carrington was adopted, and thirty badges were ordered.

Mr. Atkinson, chairman of the Printing Committee, was authorized to procure a limited number of badges for representatives of the press.

It was decided that the committee badges shall be left in the charge of Secretary Humphrey, and that they will be ready for distribution at his office Seventh and J streets on Friday afternoon.

It is understood that all members of the committee will be at the M-street entrance to Capitol Park promptly at 8 o'clock on Saturday morning, there to receive the President and party.

Another meeting of the committee will, however, be held in Pioneer building on Friday evening.

The Executive Committee will meet at that place this evening.

COUNTRY VISITORS.

Several Excursions From Interior Towns Being Arranged.

It is now assured that the great concourse which will welcome the President upon his arrival in Sacramento will be very materially swelled by excursionists from all the neighboring cities and towns.

Efforts are being made to run a special train down from Marysville, and if it is decided upon there will no doubt be a large crowd that city.

A citizen of Placerville, who was in town yesterday, stated that preparations were being made to run a special train to Sacramento in time to see the President. Excursions will run from Colfax, and the regular train from Auburn will bring down a great crowd.

It is known that thousands will come from all parts of Sacramento County in teams.

It is understood that the employes of the railroad shops will be given a half-holiday, so that they may participate in the parade and the other festivities.

LICENSES FOR DIVES.

The Notorious "Rosebud" Den of Thieves Said to Have One.

Judge Cravens Makes a War-Talk Before the City Trustees—Harbormaster and Health Officer.

It will never be possible to purify the slums of this city until the City Trustees shall brace up, put forth the power vested in them, and wipe out the dives and hell-holes that disgrace the community by harboring thieves, cut-throats, prostitutes, opium fiends, and all manner of criminal and degraded human beings.

That body some months ago made a little sport and passed an ordinance providing for the revocation of licenses granted to disorderly places, where liquors are sold, and also for the refusal of licenses to persons establishing new dives. The ordinance was contested and defeated in the local courts, but since then both the Supreme and Circuit Courts have rendered decisions upholding a similar ordinance passed by the municipal authorities of San Francisco.

Yet no effort has been made by the Trustees of this city to put the ordinance into force, and licenses are issued and the dives continue to breed criminals as of yore.

At the special meeting of the City Trustees yesterday Mayor Comstock called attention to the fact that a license had just been issued to some person to reopen the notorious "Rosebud" den on I street, and called upon Police Judge Cravens to explain the law governing the power of the City Trustees to control the issuance of licenses.

Judge Cravens referred to the ordinance in force requiring any person desiring licenses to run saloons to present petitions to the board, accompanied by the good character of the place, and read from the decisions of the Supreme and Federal Courts as to the power of local legislative bodies to revoke licenses issued, or to revoke licenses previously issued, and held that there was no question as to the right of the Trustees to refuse or revoke licenses of dives and disorderly places. He said that there is now a State law on the subject that is even stronger than the ordinance.

At the meeting of the board on the preceding day that a license had been issued to one Welch to reopen the "Rosebud" den, and he had no doubt the place would be the headquarters of thieves and low characters of both sexes, as it had been in the past. The board had the right to refuse to issue a license to a place closed by the police for refusing to issue licenses to flourish in the saloons, and the board, he said, is a proper one, and should be enforced. In nearly all cities of the East similar ordinances are in force to regulate the sale of liquors.

The matter was discussed at some length, Judge Cravens saying that the enforcement of the ordinance would do no hardship on any person engaged in the saloon business. He knew of several saloons that were conducted so properly that he (the judge) would not be hesitating in going on the bonds of their proprietors in signing their petitions for licenses.

Trustee Conklin suggested that the matter be referred to the board of health, and the Mayor, who could consult with the City Attorney and License Collector on the subject.

The suggestion was adopted.

ELECTION OF HARBORMASTER.

Mr. Conklin called upon the matter of electing a Harbormaster, and nominated the incumbent, N. A. Kildler.

Mr. McLaughlin wanted the matter laid over until the next regular meeting.

Mr. Conklin's motion was carried, and Captain Kildler was elected, all the members voting aye.

Mr. McLaughlin gave notice of a motion to reconsider.

CONCERNING THE HEALTH OFFICER.

In regard to the matter of electing a Health Officer, the Mayor asked that it be allowed to lay over until the City Board of Health shall organize and recommend somebody for the place.
