THE NAVY-YARD.

Condition of Vessels at Mare Island—The Charley. The array of naval vessels at the Mare Island Navy-yard would lead one to suppose that a great deal of work is being carried on in the way of repairs, but such is not the case. During the next month, according to reports, the number of vessels to be sent away will make a great change in the yard. Of the serviceable vessels that are lying at anchor may be mentioned the Charleston, Mohican, Marion, Alert and Thetis. The former vessel has had placed on board her cargo of coal and list of stores, and to-morrow she will probably come to this city on her way to sea, for the purpose of testing the 8-inch gun and drilling the crew in target practice. She will then return to the yard and await orders from the Navy Department. Where she will any order of the kind is definitely known. The Thetis will most likely leave the yard after the Charleston. The vessel is ready to depart and has been for some time, but the delay in starting her off is due to the fact that she lacks her complement of officers and men. How soon the department at Washington will make the necessary order for the transfer of men to the vessel is not known. The Thetis on leaving the yard will proceed to the mouth of the San Joaquin and engage in survey work.

On Saturday last a change was made in the command of the vessel, Captain Stockton being relieved by Captain Geo. C. Reiter, who was recently reinstated to duty by Secretary of the Navy Tracy. Captain Stockton will return East, having been granted two months' leave of absence. The Marion and Mohican are both ready for a cruise, but it is more than likely that the latter will get away first. No orders have been received as to what duty will be assigned either vessel, but in all likelihood one of them will relieve the Ranger, which is now at the mouth of the San Joaquin. With the departure of the above-named vessels the only one remaining will be the Alert. This vessel has been made the cause of much trouble lately, for several persons care to say anything about her, and very little interest is taken by yard officials or workmen in the service she will be called upon to perform. The work of the members of the last Board of Survey on the vessel was completed on Saturday last, and the report was immediately forwarded to the Navy Department at Washington. What the contents of the report were could not be learned from any of the officers of the yard, but from other sources it was ascertained that the career of the Alert at Mare Island will be very short. In brief, the report of the Board of Survey is to the effect that the vessel is in serviceable condition and can be started off on a three-year cruise at a cost not exceeding \$1,200. It is understood that the report will be considered by any portion of the vessel, and the different departments will have a chance to earn a portion of the nominal sum that it will cost to start her off.

The stories recently given out that the ship could be punched in the hull of the boiler, and that it was necessary to repair work was observed throughout the vessel, are now declared to have been circulated for the purpose of detaining yard officials or workmen in the service she will be called upon to perform. The work of the members of the last Board of Survey was completed on Saturday last, and the report was immediately forwarded to the Navy Department at Washington. What the contents of the report were could not be learned from any of the officers of the yard, but from other sources it was ascertained that the career of the Alert at Mare Island will be very short. Yesterday the Alert was taken out of the stone dock under the supervision of the Chief Engineer, and was hauled alongside the quay wall. Outwardly the vessel presents a splendid appearance, and in the interior the work is in a most satisfactory condition. It will be remembered that through alleged "carelessness of work" performed on the Alert, Naval Constructor Feaster was recently relieved from duty at Mare Island, but at the present time everything points toward the exoneration of that official and the upholding of the report made by him some months ago that the Alert was in a serviceable condition. When in the dock the vessel was thoroughly overhauled by the members of the Survey Board, and the report on the condition of the vessel was just submitted to the department. It will be the final one, and the one upon which orders will be issued concerning the future movements of the ship.

Admiral Benham could give no information regarding what is to be done with the Swatara, Nipisic or Adams, and stated that the fate of the latter serviceable vessels now at the yard the outlook for work in the matter of repairs to other ships was not very encouraging. The Adams is expected to arrive at the yard from Mexico in a short time," he said, "but I am unable to say what repairs she may need. The Ranger will undoubtedly follow her to the yard from Guatemala, and as she has been away for some time possibly she may require extensive repairs. As to this, however, will be determined on the arrival by a Board of Survey. Generally speaking affairs are very quiet at the present time. There is not a great amount of work to be performed on the Alert, and the department determines to repair the Nipisic, Adams or Swatara, there will be little or no work to be done on the Alert, or Monitor Monadnock, for the next two months."

From Captain Wilson it was also ascertained that during the past week, on account of the slackness of work, the force of workmen on the yard was cut down from 688 to 532, and a further decrease in the number employed was probable.
