

ROUGH ON HYMAN.

What it Cost Him to Recover Nineteen Dollars.

A Rather Expensive Lesson in Litigation—The Darmody Boys' Clothes—Jurors' Questions.

The hearing of the suit of Jacob Hyman against Mrs. S. F. Darmody for the recovery of several hundred dollars, alleged to be due for merchandise purchased by Mrs. Darmody's sons, was concluded in Superior Judge Van Fleet's court yesterday.

Three of Mrs. Darmody's sons are of age while the fourth is still a minor. The family had been in the habit of keeping a running account with Hyman, but as the sons reached their majority, the mother declined further responsibility for their debts.

After the case was argued by the attorneys on both sides it was submitted to the jury.

After deliberating several hours the jury came into court, and the foreman announced that they could not agree.

Judge Van Fleet wanted to know what was the matter.

Juror Bauer said there were several questions they were in doubt about.

In the first place they wanted to know whether or not a mother should be responsible for the debts of a son who was not of age.

The jury then retired again, and returned in a quarter of an hour with a verdict for Hyman of \$19.00.

Hyman looked very disconsolate when he heard the verdict.

He had a right to be, for the suit turned out to be a very bad speculation for him.

It seems that just before the taking of testimony in the suit Hyman on visits to the attorney for Mrs. Darmody offered in court to settle with Hyman by paying him \$25 and the costs of suit.

The jury fees alone amount to \$48, and when he gets the verdict of \$19.00 and attorney's fees, the costs will have reached a couple of hundred dollars.
