AN IMPORTANT MATTER.

In this number of the RECORD-UNION we present a synopsis of information upon the subject of sewage disposal. The facts are gleaned from official reports of investigations made by the city of Worcester, Mass. That city has adopted the chemical precipitation system, and now has it in successful operation. The paper to which we refer explains what this system is. It also treats of the possibility of such a means of disposal being applied to the conditions that prevail in Sacramento.

In the opinion of the RECORD-UNION, there is no more pressing and important matter demanding public attention and prompt official action than that of the disposal of our drainage and sewage. The matter has been so long neglected that it cannot be ignored another year without assuming great risk of permanent injury to the best interests of the city. We invite the attention, therefore, of all the people to the paper in question.

BEHIND SEA AND NORTH SEA.

In his recent note to Lord Salisbury, the United States Secretary of State referred to the extra territorial jurisdiction claimed by Great Britain off the coast of Scotland, as parallel with the claim of the United States in Behring Sea. It is well to understand this matter more in detail. Readers, therefore, who desire to more definitely ascertain just what the claims referred to are, can have an object lesson by taking an atlas and turning first to the map of Scotland.

Upon the extreme northeast they will find a cape marked "Duncansby Head," and below it, near the extreme east point of land, they will find "Rattray Bay." The north point should be marked Rattray Point. A line drawn straight from Duncansby Head to Rattray Point will mark the water boundary of the 2,700 miles of open water in the North Sea, referred to by the Secretary of State. This line is precisely 85 miles long. From its center to the mouth of Moray Firth is 55 miles. The shore line on the south of this marine territory is 62 miles, and on the north 56 miles.

In this water, with an open mouth of 86 miles to the North Sea, Great Britain claims exclusive jurisdiction to direct and regulate the modes and times of fishing, and her claim has not these many years been disputed, because it is conceded that it is necessary there should be regulation and Great Britain is the nearest nation and owns the land on two sides.

Turning now to the map of Alaska, a straight line should be drawn from the center of Behring Strait almost due southwest until it meets the Aleutian chain—United States territory—just west of Attu Island. Drawn accurately, this boundary, starting exactly midway between East Cape and Cape Prince of Wales, at about half its projection will cross exactly the 120° line of longitude from Washington intersects the 60° parallel of latitude. This boundary is 1,100 miles long, but the opening it describes is not into a sea, but faces and is close to the Russian shore, and on its other side that country exercises the jurisdiction we claim upon this side; not that over a closed sea, but over waters habitied by the seals.

The boundaries we have given inclose the Pribyloff Islands, and the sixty-five miles radius claimed by the United States. These islands are distant from the water boundary referred to 300 miles, and from our island chain about 200 miles. American land territory describing considerably more than two sides of the marine territory, and Great Britain having no territory within 1,400 miles of the Pribyloff Islands.

WOMEN IN TRADE.

The New York Commercial Advertiser not long ago devoted much space in its columns to show that the shop women of New York are grievously overworked and underpaid. The trouble seems to be that however low salesmen's wages may fall, those of the saleswomen are always rated lower still. This is one of the evils of women rushing into business and abandoning domesticity and housewifely arts to displace male labor, as the RECORD-UNION has frequently pointed out. If it were possible for the wages of men and women in like employment to be fair and generous, and remain the same, very much of the evil would be removed. But we have never taken part in the hallelujah shouting of those who have forwarded the work of putting girls into commercial paths.

We are told that woman has been forcing her way into the employments of men, and that, therefore, wherever she can go she ought to go. A greater mistake was never made. She should not go where the displacement of men will lower the wage, and reduce the capacity of the male to found and maintain a home. She should not force her way into callings that wear away the bloom of modesty and womanliness and make the female a measurer and weigher in barter at the expense of her capacity to be at the head of a home with a new generation about her knees. Man, as the Advertiser well puts it, is the bread-winner by nature's irrevocable decree,

AT THE SHOPS.

Activity in All Departments at the Railroad Works. The outlook for a busy season in the railroad shops was never more encouraging than at present, and even now the force of men at work is very large. There are some 2,000 employed, and there is activity in all the departments.

In the blacksmith shop there is not a vacant forge or anvil. All the men that can be accommodated in this department are engaged, and they can scarcely keep up with the demands from other departments. In the boiler shop dozens of old boilers are being repaired, and several new ones are in the course of construction, among the latter being two large locomotive boilers. The frames of the engines are being made in the blacksmith shop, and they are among the heaviest that have ever been made in this city. The locomotives will be twelve-wheelers, and of the most perfect design of mauline labor.

Work has just been completed on twenty-five narrow-gauge freight cars and they will be ready for shipment in a few days. To show what an immense amount of work can be accomplished in a short time by the force of carpenters and painters, it may be stated that this lot of cars were built entirely in four days.

Four or five handsome palace cars are being in the paint shop, and others are being made than this. THEY WILL STAY.

Judge Cravens Refuses to Reduce the Bail of the Smith Gang. Harry Gordon, William Furlong and J. D. Smith, the men implicated in the murderous attack on Robert Allen two weeks ago, were up before the Police Court yesterday for examination on charges of robbery.

Clerk Dunn read a joint complaint charging each of the defendants with the crime, and they demanded separate trials. Smith was represented by Frank Estabrook, who asked that the bail of \$10,000 be reduced to "a reasonable sum," that his client might procure bondsmen. He also asked for the amount of \$10,000 to be paid for the offense charged, and hoped the court would lessen it.

City Attorney Hart opposed the request, and stated that the court would be fully justified in refusing bail to any of the defendants until he was satisfied beyond a doubt that the victim of the attack would recover from his injuries. Mr. Allen was still in a critical condition, and in case of his death, which might yet occur, the charge of murder would be preferred for that of robbery, and bail would then be refused altogether. He thought that \$10,000 in each case was a reasonable bond.

CAR BURGLARS.

Burns and Bradley Held to Answer by Judge Henry. William Bradley and William Burns, the young men who were captured last week by Constables Brissel and Alter with a quantity of dry-goods stolen from a freight car in their possession, were brought before Justice of the Peace Henry yesterday afternoon for examination.

Neither of the culprits attempted to make any defense other than to make a rambling statement about how they "found" the property in an empty freight car at Port Costa. Bradley, who is only 17 years of age, declared that they did not break into a car, but found the property already bundled in gunny sacks in an empty car. Just as they approached the train at Port Costa, he said, four men jumped out of this car and ran away. He and Burns then went into the car to sleep, and rode in it to Davisville. He declared that he and Burns forgot to leave the bundles behind.

Judge Henry held both of the young men to answer the charges of burglary preferred against them, and set their bonds at \$1,000 each, in default of which they were locked up in the County Jail pending trial. They will in all probability plead guilty in the upper court.

HE GOT OFF LIGHTLY.

John Ryan, the young man who forged A. J. Pommer's signature to an order for a week's board and lodging at the Tremont Hotel, pleaded guilty in the Police Court yesterday to a charge of fraudulently obtaining meals, and was sentenced to six months imprisonment. In administering the extreme punishment, Judge Cravens pushed the defendant by informing him that he was in big luck that a charge of forgery did not rest upon him, for which he would have had to serve several years in the penitentiary.
