THE TROUBLE ON THE ORINOCO.

In response to inquiries as to what is the general issue between the Government of Venezuela and the Government of Great Britain, which occasioned our Secretary of State to intimate that this country would view with more than jealousy any permanent exclusive control by the British of the Orinoco, we reply: Great Britain's British-Guiana borders on the east upon the territory of Venezuela. The boundary line between the Province and State has for various reasons remained unsettled. The coast surveys of neither nation have been able to definitely fix it because so much has depended upon treaty interpretation, and upon historical fact.

Close to the disputed line lie exceedingly valuable mineral deposits. They are mainly upon the Venezuelan side, as the line is claimed to run. But as its locality is disputed, the British have frequently passed over into this mineral territory, and this alleged trespass has been denounced by Venezuela and protests duly entered. A few years ago Venezuela besought the Government of the United States to intervene and endeavor to settle the dispute. Secretary Bayard accordingly presented the matter to the British Foreign Office, but nothing came of the attempted mediation.

Last year the British Government authorized entry upon certain parts of the disputed territory along the Orinoco River, where there are exceedingly valuable mineral deposits. These the British seized, and asserted their claim of right. The Venezuelan Government entered its protest and gave notice that it would resist the trespass. Thereupon the British sent to the mouth of the Orinoco a gunboat to meet, and resist if necessary, the gunboat Faro, which the Venezuelan authorities had stationed there. The British commander ordered the Captain of the Venezuelan vessel to lower his colors while the Union Jack was aloft, thus asserting British supremacy in those waters. The commander of the Faro obeyed, but with the statement that he did so because cowed by superior naval force, and occupied the disputed mineral belt. In November last the intermediation of the United States was again asked, and there the matter rests. If the British claim is sustained, Venezuela will lose the Yuruari gold fields, and the exclusive control of the mouth of the Orinoco.

This magnificent river has long since been declared free to the commerce of all nations. The Orinoco is about 1,500 miles in length and has seventeen mouths, its delta beginning 130 miles from the sea. Some of the small mouths flowing north-erly empty into the Gulf of Paria, while the others fall into the Atlantic direct. The main stream for forty miles from its debouchment is divided by a line of islands with a two-mile channel on either side. At the extreme mouth the river is about sixty miles in width, but it is filled with a bar in the center of which is a channel with fifteen feet of water. Several of the lesser mouths are navigable. The main river as far back as 500 miles from the ocean is three miles in width. Tide is manifest 240 miles up stream, and there, at Angostura, the river is four miles wide and 390 feet deep.

The Orinoco drains an area of 250,000 square miles, and the river has over 400 navigable tributaries. It is the third river of importance of the South American Continent, and it lies almost wholly within Venezuelan territory, the mouth, however, emptying on the south against British Guiana for a very short distance. British Guiana lies east of Venezuela, and with the Atlantic, forms its eastern boundary. It is altogether probable that the disputed boundary will be settled by arbitration and that no conflict of arms will take place. The Venezuelans appear to have the best claim, but it is impossible without careful and long examination of the treaties and history of the country to say precisely what is the legal strength of the respective disputants in this matter.

INTERPRETING THE BALLOT LAW.

The reform ballot system has now been adopted, in one form or another, in three-fifths of the States. In some of them its operation is as yet confined to cities. But the seed is sown in all such cases. With the California law its friends should presently busy themselves. It is not a month too early. For it is essential that it be applied and carried out uni-

formly. But it happens that a great deal depends upon the interpretation to be given to certain sections of the law by the clerks and supervisors of the fifty-four counties of the State. Some of these are pretty sure to blunder, not perhaps purposefully, but where so many are to construe the law some are liable to err.

Our proposition is that the friends of the law, those who have spent so much time, energy and human vigor in engraving it upon the State system, should by some sort of organized method, this summer, exhaustively illustrate the law by explanation of its sections, by sample blanks, ballots, designs of polling-booths, reports, tally-sheets and notes of procedure. If a central body thus prepares the way, in each county a small organization can be made that will see to it that the people in the country are thoroughly informed of the scheme and detailed workings of the law, and see to it that the clerks, supervisors and others who will have special duties to perform under the law, do not blunder in their discharge, and thus bring the law into disrepute.

Such organizations would not be impertinent; on the contrary it is the right of the people to erect them, and to take all precautionary steps that they deem proper to prevent reproach being visited upon the law and those who urged and secured its adoption.

If executed according to the plain and obvious intent of its sections, and in a spirit of fairness, it will prove a success beyond peradventure. But if its interpretation is to be made by bosses, by its enemies, by the ignorant, and by those who have not made it a study, its inauguration may be made the means of its defeat.

A STRANGE people are the English. They applaud the gambler who cheated and condemn those who mercifully declined to cheat him in return. Not that any sympathy is due the Prince of Wales for his part in the affair, nor for his plea that he respected the memory of Gordon Cumming's father too much to expose his son. The Prince's error has been by him confessed, and that he behaved in a spirit of the military dignity of an officer should not tolerate, but we fail to understand why so much sympathy should be extended to the convicted cheater at cards. The whole lot are in an unenviable position, but by strange reversal of the public judgment the man who is most guilty appears to have most sympathy, and saves his disgrace by marriage with a millionaire heiress, while all the world claps its hands in applause.

In making up the new Court of Private Land Claims, President Harrison has done himself credit and the country will accord it, by appointing to the bench two Democrats out of the five Judges named. It was equivalent to saying that in the constitution of courts the Executive does not recognize party claims as supreme. This is the more notable because it has not been expected, nor has it been customary for Executives to fill bench appointments from the ranks of political opponents. Two of the new Judges are from the South, one being a Tennessean and another a North Carolinian. The three others are from the West. The political consideration never should enter in when composition of courts is to be undertaken, and that there is departure from it is cause for sincere congratulation.

AFTER all the difficulties that the two nations have experienced in the settlement of the preliminaries for arbitration in the Behring Sea issue, so much has been accomplished that the sea has now been declared closed for one year against sealing. This is cause for gratification. The first step having been taken towards peaceful settlement there is now every reason to expect that a solution of the difficulty will be had without further acrimonious debate.
