HANNIBAL HAMLIN.

The death of Hannibal Hamlin removes from national view one of the men who were foremost in activity in the severest hours of trial the nation experienced after its revolutionary struggle.

Several times he was sent to Congress as a Democrat in 1842 and again in 1844, and in 1848 was made a member of the United States Senate.

Leaving the high office in 1865 he became Collector of the Port of Boston, but in 1869 was again returned to the Senate.

He served his country at the Court of Spain for a year, resigning to follow the pursuits of his heart, those closely connected with law, education and letters.

He was for sixteen years a regent of the Smithsonian Institution and for twenty years a trustee of Colby University, and by both institutions was voted high honors.

He was Hamlin who secured the passage of the famous Wilmot proviso; who stood upon the floor of the Senate in 1856 and proclaimed a change in his political allegiance because his conviction was that the national peril was great and demanded of patriots to array themselves against slavery and for union.

He was Hamlin who was and was not a great man. He was not a leader, for his ambitions were not politically lofty, and he cared too little for the plaudits of men.

But, after all, compared with the doings of some of the Princes of England, and some of the Kings and Queens of the realm, this affair of Albert Edward is a milk-and-water thing, and it is because so trivial a matter thus stirs the British public as the notes of the English press disclose, that the belief is justified that England is not far distant from the time when the traditional hold of a titled aristocracy will be broken; not rudely, perhaps, but surely and for all time.

The loyalty of the English to the aristocratic system is something wonderful; it will not be dispossessed by any single incident, but the growth of liberal sentiment; the enlargement of the idea that all government springs from the consent of the governed; the discovery of the fact that no longer can any coercive measures be employed to compel obedience to the arbitrary will of an official holding by hereditary claim; the amazing fact that the prospective ruler of three hundred millions of people is compelled by force of public opinion to apologize, in effect, to them.

The Itata has returned to American waters under arrest by the United States steamer Charleston. It appears that the American fleet had orders to seize every Chilean insurgent ship, and to blockade all insurgent ports, if refusal was made to surrender the Itata.

They were under command and obeyed; as to the ship's officers, the chief is a German subject, the second in command a New Granadan we believe.

These will be very diligently followed is scarcely probable; nor indeed is it necessary to pursue them sharply.

It is probable, therefore, that they will follow the fate of the ship, though there may be a question whether we have strictly the right to confiscate them. This, however, cannot come up without a claimant coming forward, and there is none at present in view.
