

THE ELECTRIC ROAD.

Mr. Henry Writes a Letter on the Subject.

Why the Central Street Railway Company Want a Franchise on Sixth Street, Instead of Farther West—Will the Trustees Grant It?

The application of the Central Street Railway Company for a franchise to run electric cars on Sixth street, from J to P, and thence up P to Twenty-eighth, which is backed by an almost unanimous petition of the property owners along the proposed line, has created quite a commotion in the southwest corner of the city, and a controversy has arisen in which considerable ill-feeling is being manifested.

The Central Company has applied for a franchise to run on Sixth and on P streets, because, as the directors argue, it will do more business if the road is located on Sixth street than if it runs farther west.

But right here is where the trouble arises. Mr. Henry says that he has considered that the road will be paying off if it runs through Sixth street, and that he does not want a franchise on any street farther west and will not build a road there, while some of the residents of the southwest portion of the city are trying to induce the Trustees to take the position that if the company will not build the road on Second or Third street, it shall not have the franchise at all.

One of the Trustees has been credited with the statement that he would not vote for the franchise unless it was changed to read Second or Third street, instead of Sixth. He subsequently denied that he had gone that far, though he was strongly in favor of the road going through Second or Third street.

Some pains have been taken to learn the feelings of the people generally in regard to the matter, and the result of the opinion seems to be that it would be very desirable to have a street-car line run by the Art Gallery and accommodate the people in the central and southwest portions of the city, if anyone can be induced to build such a road, but that it would be gross injustice to all of the rest of the city to drive the capital and the city proposed to be invested in the new line, which will undoubtedly accommodate a vast number of people and add greatly to the general welfare of the city.

The Record-Union has already published all of the arguments in favor of the road going through Second or Third street, as stated by the Directors of the Museum Association and citizens of the Second Ward, and in this article simply reviews the situation and points out that there is now only one question before the Board of Trustees, and that is whether or not it will grant a franchise for a road through Sixth street to P and thence through P to Twenty-eighth.

Mr. Henry's Explanation. The following letter was received from J. H. Henry, the President and principal owner of the Central Street Railway Company, Saturday.

MANGLED BY THE CARS.

Two Farm Hands Meet With Tragic Deaths Near Florin.

Fred Case Is Completely Beheaded—He and Joseph Mooney Fell Asleep on the Track.

A shocking accident occurred early yesterday morning about a mile and a half north of Florin. It was about 4:30 o'clock when freight train No. 109 came thundering northward from Stockton.

When the train was stopped and an investigation made the trainmen found the mangled remains of two men beneath the wheels. It was a sickening sight. Both men had been killed instantaneously.

At the morgue the bodies were identified as those of Frederick Case and Joseph Mooney, farm hands, who were employed on the ranch of Davis & Son, which is near where the accident occurred.

From what could be learned it appears that Case and Mooney got the train about 9 o'clock Saturday night to attend the ball at Florin.

Both of the unfortunate men were unmarried. Case was a native of Kentucky and 39 years of age. Mooney was about 25 years of age and a native of Canada.
