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ITS BACKBONE BROKEN.

The Hot Wave Appears to have Flattened Out.

Cool Breezes From the Southwest—Relief to the State—Will There be Another Hot Spell?

The Weather Bureau reports show the temperatures at 5 A. M. and 5 P. M. yesterday to have been 61° and 86°, while the highest and lowest were 94° and 69°, with brisk southerly winds and a cloudless sky.

The barometrical readings at 5 A. M. and 5 P. M. were 29.83 and 29.84 inches, showing a slight rise in the barometer.

The highest and lowest temperatures one year ago yesterday were 101° and 67°, and one year ago to-day 91° and 69°.

Yesterday at 5 P. M. it was twelve degrees cooler than on Sunday at the same hour, and the highest yesterday was ten degrees less than on Sunday.

The brisk southerly wind, blowing from twelve to fifteen and eighteen miles per hour, is what has effected such a change.

Yesterday must be classed with the hot days, making sixteen continuous ones.

This is the second time in fifteen years of such an occurrence, and it may be the end of the protracted and unprecedented hot wave—unprecedented because the highest temperature never went lower than 92°, while the greatest high reached was 106°, and 100° and over on five days, as against the long heated spell of sixteen days, from June 29, 1882, to July 14, 1882, when the thermometer never reached above 88° and fell as low as 80°.

This tropical wave, therefore, beats the record for intensity for such a long time.

The forecasting office at San Francisco, Lieutenant Finley, predicted that the warm wave would be broken on yesterday—that is, it would be the end of that time when the temperature would not go above 90° in the shade. Let us hope that the prediction will be verified.
