ILLEGITIMATE BANKING.

There is nothing of greater importance to the people of a country than that its banking business shall be done upon legitimate principles. The whole subject, however, is involved in a mesh of difficulties chiefly because of the sensitiveness of depositors in certain institutions.

The recent disclosures concerning the relations of the Pacific Bank of San Francisco to the People's Home Savings Bank is a case in point. It transpires that the People's Home Savings Bank was a sort of side show to a commercial bank; that the Pacific Bank was the Treasurer of the People's Home Savings Bank. The statement needs scarcely to be enlarged to show that the relation was neither in accordance with banking principles nor good financial ethics.

Just so far as the people in municipalities are by the schemes of the trading and trafficking bosses robbed of their right to locally govern, the Union itself is assailed. As Mr. Adams puts it: Weaken either principle of our Government, and its integrity is in peril. Attack the one, you threaten the life of the Nation, and you simply shift your point of aiming at the vital part of the life of the land. It is safe to assert that an attack has already begun on the principle of self-government of our cities.
