A DELIGHTFUL LAND TO LEAVE.

The Russian Prince, Westsherski, recently said through the columns of the Grashdanin: "All popular education is evil." Official circles in St. Petersburg applauded and approved the utterance.

Nor is it, in such a land, where such a code obtains, surprising that the Chief of Police, as in Uladovka should order that hereafter no working man or woman may instruct their children.

What do those working people in the United States who are led by false prophets and foreign disturbers to complain of free government of the republic think of their condition compared with that of their fellow-men in Uladovka?

It is amazing that such preaching as the Prince Westsherski indulged in, and such actions as characterize the Police Department of Uladovka should not receive the condemnation of the imperial head of the people, and cause the issuance of a royal decree of revocation.

A POOR POLICY.

The free silver plank in the platform of the Ohio Democracy was adopted against the vote of nearly one-half of the convention.

This situation has alarmed the leading Democratic press of the country. Here we find that old liner, the Baltimore Sun, saying:

A declaration of doctrine made by so slight a majority as that in Ohio practically amounts to very little as an expression of party principle, and is calculated to do far more harm than good.

Of course the conclusion thus reached is a timorous and trimming one. But then it is characteristic of Democratic organizations and exponents. They are usually disposed to wait to "see which way the cat is going to jump"; they rarely have the courage equal to the emergency.

This idea of waiting until the party has "made up its mind," is really a suggestion to wait until it is found which is likely to be the winning side.

UNITED ODD FELLOWS.

Their Annual Convention Now in Session Here.

The Order Composed Exclusively of Colored Men--Its Steady Growth--Grand Ball To-night.

The annual Convention of colored Odd Fellows of the Pacific Coast Jurisdiction was commenced in this city yesterday at Pioneer Hall.

The supreme head of the order is in Philadelphia, and its principles are of the same general character as those of the regular Odd Fellows' Order. It has a total membership of about 130,000, and the published reports show it to be growing rapidly.

The first lodge was organized in New York in 1845, and Golden Gate Lodge, the first on this coast, was started in San Francisco in 1873.




