AN EXCELLENT PROPOSITION.

The proposition of the State Board of Trade to promote a scheme to discreetly distribute throughout Great Britain samples of California dried fruit, is an eminently wise one and ought to be carried out speedily and in all fullness.

What we need especially is a market for those products of California which are, here at least, believed to be of superior quality. The better article will always find a purchaser at an advanced price over the ordinary.

If one-half the claims we make for our dried fruits are sound we can go into that market with confidence. If a taste for the product thus introduced is established, we will have solved a large part of the fruit market question, since the dried fruit shipments involve comparatively little or no risks, can be made at greatly less cost for transportation, and placed for sale with immensely less friction and commercial machinery than are involved in green fruit disposal.

Let us hope that the scheme proposed by Mr. McAfee of Kern County, and unanimously adopted by the State Board of Trade, will be at once put into operation. The experiment is worth every cent it will cost, even at the minimum of success that will attend it, while the probabilities are that it will prove the most profitable investment ever made in behalf of production in the State.



Resolution of Intention No. 104.

RESOLVED, THAT IT IS THE INTENTION of the Board of Trustees of the City of Sacramento to order the following street work to be done, to wit: That Seventh street, in said city, from the north line of F street to the north line of H street, be (where not already done) improved by grading and graveling to the official grade; constructing Oregon pine plank crosswalks at the alley crossings and at the intersection of Seventh and F streets, and constructing red wood curbing and filling behind the same for a width not to exceed eight (8) feet. The Record-Union is hereby designated as the newspaper published and circulated in the City of Sacramento in which notice of the adoption of this resolution of intention shall be published for a period of two days and the notice thereof for six days, as often as said newspaper shall be issued therein.
