

THE TABLES TURNED.

McCloskey's Team Comes Near Facing to Pitches.

Pitcher Jackson and His Battling O'Day's Disastrous Playing at Second Base.

Nary a compliment did McCloskey bestow on his players yesterday afternoon after the game. On the contrary he told them they couldn't play ball a little bit, and if they had heard him denouncing some of the "yellow" plays during the contest, they would not have doubted for a moment but that he was in earnest.

AS VIEWED BY McCLOSKEY. It is little wonder that the manager's ire was aroused yesterday afternoon as he sat in the press box and watched the San Jose team try with his men. The visitors would have had a very difficult task to win the game had O'Day and McGuirk played as they should. Then big, lanky pitcher Jackson looked altogether out of place on the diamond. He seemed to have good speed and fair control of the ball, and these were all of his good qualities that were noticeable. He did not understand how to field his position, and moreover, did not seem to think it was a pitcher's duty to do anything in that line.

FOUR TIMES IN SUCCESSION. On strikes, and he appeared all the more stupid because he did not even hit at the ball. Only twice during the entire game did he swing the bat, and then it was one of those timid, uncertain pushes, which would easily convince a spectator that he had not the remotest idea of touching the ball. In fact, it looked to many as though he would have been badly frightened if he had but by some "lucious-potter" shoot succeeded in colliding with the ball.

O'DAY'S ERROR. After the sixth inning was over the score stood 4 to 2 in favor of the Gardeners. In the seventh, Mel Hall, three-base hit and a sacrifice fly by Reynolds, netted the Sacramento one run and the score then stood 4 to 3. When the Dukes came to bat Ehrhart pitched to McVey and went to first on "four balls." McVey blew out to Roberts. Then Dooley came to bat and drove a bounding grounder straight at O'Day, who was covering second base. Here was an easy opportunity for a double play and the retirement of the side, but O'Day couldn't handle the ball without joggling it, and three men were safe on bases. Ehrhart pitched to Dooley on Hassamer's low throw to the home plate, which Bowman allowed to pass, and a sacrifice fly to Reynolds by Harper.

HOW THEY PLAYED. Harper pitched his usual good game and was well supported. Roberts' and Reynolds' field work was brilliant. The latter, by his ability as a ball player, has already made himself a big favorite with the audience. Spies played third base like a veteran, and as a thrower has no equal among the third basemen in the League. Following is the score:

DINGLEY'S DOMICILE

The Scene of a Very Lively Midnight Disturbance.

The Women in the Family Rush Out Into the Street in Wild Confusion.

City Attorney Hart, Night Jailor Clark and a Record-Union reporter were sitting in front of the Station House last night, engaged in conversation, when they were startled by the screaming of women near by. All three jumped up from their chairs and started up a street in the direction from whence the yelling seemed to be coming, and had gotten opposite the Dingley building, between Front and Second streets, when the front door flew open with a bang and two women rushed out, bareheaded, shoeless and stockingless. They ran down toward the station, crying and screaming at the top of their voices.

WOMAN RUSHED OUT. On the sidewalk and caught up with the other two fleeing females. All three then made for the switch-yards and huddled together in a corner near the watchman's house. In the meantime a couple of men came out of the Dingley house and then went back again. The reporter went around to find the women and had no sooner reached the spot where they were hiding when all three clamored about him and between sobs and hysterical sobs begged him to take them out of harm's reach.

IN THE COFFEE MANSSION. They all talked at once and it was quite difficult to get a connected story of the affair. One of Georgia Dingley's cries was badly swollen and the dress of Mrs. Dingley was torn in several places. She had neither stockings nor shoes on her feet, and she kept complaining that her throat pained her from choking. The story they told is, in substance, as follows: Mrs. Dingley and Georgia had been out for a walk and were going up stairs to bed when Dingley came to the head of the stairs and demanded to know where they had been. They told him it was none of his affairs, and then the racket commenced. Dingley, they claim, came down to the foot of the stairs, and seeing Georgia by the throat threw her half-way up the stair-case. He then caught Mrs. Dingley by the hair and throat and dragged her to the top of the stairs. She says he then choked her and threw her on the floor, where she lay stunned for a few moments. She hired men, Bernard Reine and Mr. Barnes, informed by her where Georgia was hiding and going to her room he found her underneath the bed.

DRAGGED BY THE HAIR. He caught hold of her hair and pulled her out. By this time Mrs. Dingley had gotten up and came in to prevent her husband from hearing Georgia. The latter was struck by the hair and was thrown about the head with a whip before the wife could interfere, and while Dingley tried to get attention to his spouse, the girl in turn gave him a couple of cuts with the black-snake. The women finally freed themselves, and Mrs. Dingley rushed pell mell down the stairs, accompanied by her step-daughter, Rose. Georgia ran down the back way, and in her flight just did manage to dodge a bucket of kitchen slops that had been hurled at her from the back porch. The story was corroborated by all three, and they declared that they would swear to any statement charging Dingley with beating them so unmercifully. Neither of them wanted to go into the house again, but after much persuasion finally were induced to return. They left the jail avowing they would have Dingley arrested in the morning. They claimed that such conduct on his part was getting them to freeze, and they did not propose to tolerate it. About midnight they went into the house, but came out again shortly, declaring that they were afraid to stay there. After consulting one another for a few minutes they entered the house again, and at last accounts everything was quiet.
