ABUSE OF AN HONEST MAN. The Marysville Democrat manifests a very commendable spirit for fair play to the very few honest men who occupied seats in the last Legislature.

The Marysville Democrat takes up a story which has been circulated concerning Bledsoe, and sets that gentleman right. The story published was to the effect that while Bledsoe was in the Legislature the people of Humboldt County were contemplating sending his parents to the poorhouse as he did not contribute a cent to their support.

A very large majority of the members of the last Legislature were venal. There is not a man, woman or child in California that does not know this. We say they were venal without the slightest fear of doing any man injustice.

It was a masterly stroke on the part of the Chilean Congressional party that put its army with unexpected suddenness between the two forces of Balmaceda. One of his armies is now far at the north, too far by any possibility to reach the Congressionals before the latter can engage the main body, twenty miles to the south.

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SYBIL'S SISTERS. Two More of Judge Sanderson's Daughters Who Have Genius. A press letter from Paris, of recent date, has this to say of the younger sisters of Miss Sybil Sanderson, who were born in this city.

Miss Edith, another sister, is already one of the most promising pianists in Paris, while Miss Marian, another daughter of this family, has exhibited talents with the pencil and brush that presage a brilliant future."

ORDINANCE NO. 283. An Ordinance Concerning Fire Plugs and Providing a Penalty for the Violation Thereof. THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE City of Sacramento do ordain as follows: Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to block or obstruct any fire-plug of the City of Sacramento by which a fire engine is prevented from attaching thereto a hose or fire-plug at a fire. It shall be the duty of all police officers of said city to report any such blockade or obstruction to the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department and to order the immediate removal of the same.
