The organization played the vaudeville theaters throughout the country with great success until September, 1884, when Evans and Hoey had "A Parlor Match" written for them.

Wm. Hoey is a native of New York City, where he was born in 1855. He made his first appearance in Tony Pastor's Theater in the spring of 1874, doing a single musical act, which was a great novelty of its kind at that time.

His success in the vaudeville theater was so great that he was soon engaged by a manager in Savannah, Ga. He played there for three weeks, but received not one cent as salary, and finally started out on his own.

He then organized a small company of his own, and for several years presented plays of a light order which largely added to his reputation. For the past several years he has been playing a series of pieces, some of them of a more or less farcical order, but many of them exhibiting his high degree of comic work.
