

MILITARY MATTERS.

What the New Medals Are Going to Look Like.

The Target Practice to Take Place This Month--Battalion Drill Next Week--Other Notes.

The semi-annual target practice of the troops of the Fourth Brigade will take place this month, and the result will determine how many of the guardsmen are entitled to medals from the State.

The trophies offered this year are somewhat different in design from those which the State has furnished in the past few years, and much more ornamental.

The main portion of the medal will be circular in form and of silver, instead of bronze. Above it will be a clasp and bar, the value of the latter designating the class to which the wearer belongs in shooting.

Those making an average of between 30 and 40 points will receive a bronze bar. Those making under 45, and 40 or over, will receive a silver bar. All guardsmen making 45 points or over will be entitled to a gold bar, and they will be required to shoot again to determine which one is the best shot in the State.

A gold medal will be given to the victor. An average will be taken between the score made by each man at the practice three or four months ago and the one made this month.

The new ranges of the Sacramento companies will be in readiness by next Sunday, and on that day the field staff, non-commissioned staff and band of the First Artillery Regiment will shoot.

Companies A, B, E and G will practice on September 27th, and Companies F of Woodland and C of Nevada City will shoot on the same day in their respective localities.

Lieutenant W. B. Maydwell will act as Inspector of the Practice and supervise the shooting of the companies.

The Fourth Brigade Staff, Signal Corps and staff orderlies will hold their target practice between 10 and 11 o'clock A. M. and 2 P. M. at the company ranges, under the supervision of Major D. J. Long, one week from next Sunday.

There will be a battalion drill at Army Hall next Tuesday evening, and Companies A, E and G will go through the maneuvers.

The term of Captain H. I. Seymour of Company E will expire the fore part of next month and an election will be ordered by the Brigade Commander. In all probability the captain will be unanimously re-elected.

The new headquarters for the officers of the brigade and regiment have been handsomely arranged, and it is proposed to change the regular monthly meeting of the officers to the first Friday in each month, instead of the first Monday.

Lieutenant Maydwell of the Regimental Staff will be on hand every Friday evening to give any information that may be desired by officers in regard to military matters.

The annual report of the number of men in the district comprising the Fourth Brigade, capable of taking arms, will be made by the Brigade Commander by October 1st, according to law.

The following discharges were made during the month: From Company A, Privates H. Baker, J. Morrill, J. W. Thomas, W. Williams and F. Eastbrook; Company B--Private Michael J. McManus and Corporal Henry Noe; Company G--Private Ed. S. Deputy.

COLLECTED THE COSTS.

A Sharper Plays a New and Successful Trick.

But He Impersonated an Officer and Will Get Himself Into Serious Trouble.

Henry Kohne, a Fourth-street saloon-keeper, came tearing into Justice of the Peace Henry's courtroom yesterday, and in an excited manner demanded to know why he was being arrested twice for the costs in the suit which James G. Davis brought against him.

Judge Henry said the costs had not even been paid one much less twice. "Yes," said Kohne, "the constable was down to my place and collected \$2.50."

Judge Henry sent for Constable Brissel and the latter promptly denied that he had collected any costs. Kohne insisted that Brissel had called at the saloon while his (Kohne's) son was presiding at the bar and collected \$2.50.

"Is your son at the saloon now?" asked the Constable. "Yes."

"Well, come along and we will go down there. If he says I got any money from him, he lies, and I'll punch his nose for him."

Kohne began to feel a little anxious for the safety of his coffer, but nevertheless willingly accompanied the officer.

Arriving at the saloon young Kohne was confronted. He promptly stated that the officer was not the man who had collected the money. He described the collector and the description closely fits one of the many sharpers who are now in town.

Judging from young Kohne's story, this fellow had evidently heard that the suit between Kohne and Davis, and boldly walking into the saloon, he was a court officer, and had come to collect the costs. He told the young man that the regular debt amounted to \$8, but he would be easy and cut it down to \$2.50.

The amount is small, but the crime of impersonating an officer is a serious one, and the courts will be made to run the rascal to earth.

Warring Exhibitors. Trouble is brewing among the owners of short-horn cattle now on exhibition at the State Fair.

Edward Younger of San Jose took the premium for his short-horns in the recent stock parade, and it is alleged, and subsequently five opportunities for pickpockets, and there were some there last night.

Two of them, however, came near coming to blows over it. Other exhibitors' side in with the Colosseum man, and on the other hand Younger says he is being conspired against by those who are envious of his success.

More Pickpockets Arrested. Last evening "fakir" was offering ten-dollar gold pieces for sale for \$5 at the corner of Fourth and K streets, and naturally a large crowd gathered around him.

Such crowds always furnish five opportunities for pickpockets, and there were some there last night. Two of them, however, came near coming to blows over it.

WANTS HER RANCHES.

Mrs. Belcher Not Satisfied With the Actions of the Lessees.

She Says They Violated Their Agreements and Refused to Pay Her Damages Asked.

Mrs. S. W. Belcher, who owns several large ranches on the Jackson road, near the Slough House, recently leased two of her places to George, Arthur and Edward Booth.

One of the places leased was the tract known as the Scott ranch, near the Consumes postoffice, and for this the Booths are alleged to have agreed to pay Mrs. Belcher a monthly rental of \$1,257.50 per year.

The other place leased was all of that part of the old Belcher ranch below Daylor's ranch, and it is claimed that the lessees agreed to pay \$1,698.75 per year for this place.

Mrs. Belcher commenced suit in the Superior Court yesterday, for damages, and the restitution of the premises, claiming that the terms of the lease had not been complied with.

According to Mrs. Belcher's complaint the terms of the lease were that the Booths should keep the ranches in good repair, take good care of the trees and vines by spraying and pruning them in good season, and by taking such other care as was deemed advisable.

The fruit that was raised on the places was to be shipped East for sale, and in Mrs. Belcher's complaint she claims to have received all the money realized on these sales, and after paying over to the lessees 35 per cent of such money for running expenses, was to withhold 65 per cent, for herself--to be applied to the rent due for the year, this plan continuing until the rent was fully paid.

In addition to this she was to be paid \$150 cash, to cover an outlay to that amount made by her for repairs on the places this year.

Mrs. Belcher set forth in her complaint that the lessees have not lived up to their agreements; that they refused to make any shipments in her name; and that they have not paid any money over to her except the \$150 due for repairs.

She further sets forth that they have not lived up to their agreement to keep the ranches in good repair. She contends that she has been damaged \$2,000, and asks the court for trouble that amount, together with \$2,000 for her expenses, and for the restitution of the premises. She also sues for the costs of the suit.

Dropped Dead. A cook named William R. Laver, employed at the County Hospital in Placerville, dropped dead in the depot at the latter place yesterday morning.

The train started he approached Conductor Lyson and asked him for a ticket. The conductor told him to go to the ticket-office, and Laver was walking off when he fell dead on the platform. He had been sick for some time, and heart disease caused his death.

Fresno Colony Company. Articles of incorporation of the Fresno Co-operative Homestead Vineyard and Colony Company of San Francisco were filed in the Secretary of State's office yesterday.

The capital stock is \$200,000, and the directors are N. A. Dorn, L. B. Beckley, Columbus S. Douglas, Charles S. Laumeister and John C. Spencer.

Over Two Hours Late. The local train from San Francisco last evening was two hours and a half late. The train had to be held at Sixteenth street, Oakland, on account of an engine jumping the track between Oakland and West Berkeley.

Robbing Bootblack. A boy named Walter Reeves was arrested last evening by Officer Shellars on a charge of petty larceny. He is accused of having stolen some brushes from a bootblack.
