

CASE FOR THE CORONER.

Mrs. Paladini Dies and a Death Certificate is Refused.

Special Officer Sheppelman's Unwarranted Eviction is Again Brought to Public Notice.

The body of Mrs. J. Paladini lies on a slab at the Morgue.

The story of the eviction of the Paladini family recently is probably familiar to the readers of the RECORD-UNION.

Mrs. Paladini was quite ill at the time of the eviction, and would not even be able to take care of her six small children.

The RECORD-UNION published the story of the eviction at the time, and as a result the matter was investigated.

Special Officer Sheppelman had no authority for acting as he did, and in consequence was placed under arrest, the charge against him being misdemeanor.

The officer explained that the owner of the house which Paladini occupied was a friend of his, and was desiring to go to the expense of a suit in the Justice Court for eviction, asked the officer to "secure" the Paladini's out with his star.

When Mrs. Paladini began to grow worse, the day after the eviction, she moved back into the basement of the house from which the family had been evicted, and City Physician Nichols was sent for.

Yesterday morning the husband of the dead woman, who charges that Sheppelman is to blame for her death, went to Police Judge Crockett and asked that the special officer be charged with murder and put under \$10,000 bonds.

TOOK HIS OWN LIFE.

A Native Son of Sacramento Found Dying at the Bay.

John Shay Ends His Life by Swallowing a Dose of Carbolic Acid—No Cause Thereof Assigned.

Last evening's San Francisco Bulletin states that shortly before 11 o'clock yesterday morning, as Park Officer McManus was patrolling his beat on the North Ridge road, he heard a noise as if some one was groaning in the bushes.

Pushing his way through the underbrush until he came to the embankment overlooking the Bay District track, he came across a man reclining on the ground and seemingly in the greatest of agony.

As he did so a small bottle which he had held in his right hand escaped from his grasp, and the cause of his death immediately became evident.

The remains were those of a young man, well-dressed, but nothing was known about the man, who had committed the rash deed.

The bottle in which he had the poison was a three-ounce vial, and from the label on it was purchased at the drug store of Harvey B. Kilbourne, on the corner of Second and Market streets.

HELD UP A BURGLAR.

A Restaurant-Keeper Interrupts a Prowler While at Work.

At the Point of a Pistol He Marches the Prisoner Toward the Police Station.

Police Captain Lee left the station-house on his regular tour of the beats last night, shortly before midnight, and when about midway between Front and Second streets, on I, noticed two men walking rapidly toward him in single file.

The man in front was a young, well-dressed fellow, and the one behind was in his shirt-sleeves, carried a pistol in his hand and appeared to be considerably excited.

The Captain could not surmise what was up, and fearing that the individual in the shirt-sleeves meant murder he quickly seized him and disarmed him.

Immediately the young fellow who was in the lead took to his heels and darted through an alley near by.

"That man is a burglar, and I caught him in my store," gasped the man whom the Captain had just disarmed.

The officer took him to the station in a twinkling and the next moment he was chasing the fugitive through the alley at a lively rate.

The young man was taken to the Police Station. He gave the name of Ralph Lewis, and upon being searched a large chased-up bag was found on him.

John Kim was the man who was in his shirt-sleeves, and he explained that he was aroused by a noise at the front door of his little restaurant on Second street.

"Well, I guess you've got me," said the burglar, and he held up his hands.

Kim then ordered him to the right-about-face and march to the Police Station. It was this march that was interrupted by Captain Lee.

After the burglar was locked up the Captain went back to the restaurant with Kim and examined the door. It bore unmistakable marks of having been pried open with a chisel.

Lewis was charged with the crime of burglary.


