Six furlongs, Carlsbad won, Roy S. second, Dolly McConne third. Time, 1:15 1/2.

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

ARSENIC AND AMMONIA.

Remarkable Contrast in the Effect of Two Poisons on the Complexion.

The slow absorption of many poisons changes in some more or less modified form the complexion, but arsenic and ammonia show their effect about as quickly as the popular belief that arsenic clears the complexion has led many silly women to kill themselves with it in small, continued doses.

It produces a waxy, ivory-like appearance of the skin during a certain stage of the poisoning, but its terrible after effects have long been known to make it of common use as a cosmetic.

The effects of ammonia upon the complexion are directly the opposite to that of arsenic. The first symptom of ammonia poisoning which appears among those who work in ammonia factories is a discoloration of the skin of the nose and forehead. This gradually extends over the face until the complexion has a stained, blotched and unsightly appearance.

With people who take ammonia in their water or food, these striking symptoms do not appear so soon. The only effect of the poison that is visible for some time is a dryness of the skin and a sallowness of the complexion.

Many people are slowly absorbing ammonia poison without knowing it. The reason for this is that the manufacturers of such cheap articles of everyday consumption as baking powders. The continued absorption of ammonia in even minute quantities as an adulterant in food is injurious, not merely from its effect upon the complexion, but because it destroys the coating of the stomach and causes dyspepsia and indigestion.

Professor Long of Chicago is authority for the statement that if fifty million parts of water there is one part of ammonia the water is dangerous.

Conflict Between Fractious. MADRID, Sept. 29.—The Carlist faction at Puente de la Reina, in Navarre, has risen against the old Carlists of Cirau Quiniera. Two parties held by women and armed with fowling-pieces and old muskets marched into the open streets to-day and exchanged fire, several persons being wounded. The combatants were finally dispersed by gendarmes. Isolated fighting, however, is continued.

Troubles Break Out Afresh. HAMBURG, Sept. 29.—The troubles between the officials and crew of the Chilean ship Pinto, which is at present moored in the river Elbe, have broken out afresh. The crew is mutinous and the Captain unable to enforce discipline, appealed to the authorities. The latter decided that it was not within the province to board the warship of a foreign nation to assist her officers.

Death of a Pioneer Lady. MERCED, Sept. 29.—Mrs. Sarah Key Silman, a pioneer of this county, died this morning at the residence of her son, W. L. Silman, aged 83 years. She leaves a large family of children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren. She was a native of Kentucky, and came to California in 1856 and settled in Merced County.

Ohio claims to have the largest oil well in this country, if not in the world. It is situated near Wellington, in Cuyahoga County, and if permitted to flow its full capacity would more than fifty-two of the 35,000-barrel tanks every twenty-four hours.

Women as Floriculturists. "During the past few years," said a well-known florist, "a number of women have taken to the cultivation of flowers as a business. The census bureau claims that there are over 300 floral establishments owned and managed by women. I know of fifty who are in the business with ten to twenty dollars' worth of stock, but in almost every case they are merely carrying on the business left them by husbands or other male relatives.

"One young German woman of Union Hill, the second wife of a well-to-do gardener, who died shortly after marriage, took hold of the business and has built up an immense trade. She studies the market closely and varies her stock in accordance with the demand, keeping always a little in advance of her competitors. Her energy and enterprise are remarkable and readily account for her great success."—New York Evening Telegram.
