

THE PRESS ASSOCIATION.

Its Third Annual Session Held Yesterday.

The Members Departed Last Night for an Excursion to the Shasta Mountains.

The California Press Association was called to order at the Press Club rooms in San Francisco yesterday at 11:30 a. m.

The minutes of the semi-annual session at Napa, held in April last, were read and approved. New members were proposed as follows and duly elected: Ralph Ellis, Napa; Woodland; George A. Broadmore, Republi-

The election of officers was then entered upon, and G. M. Francis of the Napa Register was elected President. Mr. Francis, on taking the chair, made a neat speech of thanks and encouragement.

The report of the Executive Committee set forth the condition of the association as prosperous. The membership includes representatives of one hundred and twenty-five papers—daily, weekly and monthly.

The afternoon session of the attendance was much larger. W. H. B. Dodson was to have read a paper on "Subscriptions," but pleaded excuse and was unable to read his paper later, on the excursion.

The paper was commented upon by Dr. Dodson and Vice-President Craig. Mr. Craig then reported as the association's representative at the meeting of the National Editorial Association.

A committee was ordered appointed to consider the matter of the proposed session of the National Association in California in accordance with suggestions of representative Craig.

It was announced that the Southern California Press Association had already acted in the matter, and that it was desirable that the above committee should act in conjunction with the Southern California committee.

On motion of J. A. Fitcher, the San Francisco Press Club was invited to cooperate with the State Association in the matter of the invitation to the National Association.

The association then entered upon a general debate concerning its policy and business, and continued it until the close of the session.

At 9 p. m. the association took the cars for its excursion to the Shasta Mountains.
