SEPTEMBER WEATHER.

Its Features Described by Observer Lieutenant Finley.

Generally Cool, With a Fair Quantity of Rain—Thunderstorms and Their Effects—North Winds.

Lieutenant John P. Finley, Signal Officer in charge of the Pacific Coast Weather Bureau, in his report for September says: The weather of September has shown the effect of the more southerly trend of cyclonic disturbances from the North Pacific Ocean.

The rains in California have been twenty days earlier than last season, owing to the storm areas coming further south. More rain has fallen in Northern California, Northern Nevada, Western Oregon and Western Washington than usual.

THE RAINFALL.

There has been a deficiency of precipitation generally throughout Southern California, except in San Diego, in Arizona, Eastern Washington and Eastern Oregon. The deficit in California is as follows: Tootoosh Island, 17th, 2.88 inches; Flagstaff, Arizona, 13th, 2.00; Virginia City, 14th, 1.16; Portland, 15th, 0.85; San Francisco, 23d, 0.40.

LOCAL STORMS.

Thunderstorms occurred as follows: Sacramento, 5th, some damage to property; Petaluma, 5th; Livermore, Pleasanton, Hayward and Redlands, 15th. Telephones were burned out at Pleasanton and Livermore by lightning; Bakersfield, 21st; cloudburst near Hayward, 21st; heavy rain and high winds occurred on 9 days at Fort Cauby, 9 days at Winnemucca, 10 days at Keeler.

THE TEMPERATURE.

It has been considerably above the normal in all districts, except along the Washington coast, in the San Joaquin Valley and southeastern California.
