DARING DAYLIGHT ROBBERY.

An Oregon Bank Relieved of Thirty-five Hundred Dollars.

THE THIEVES MAKE GOOD THEIR ESCAPE.

Preliminary Examination of S. W. Sullivan, Charged With Conveying Firearms to San Quentin Prison for Use of Prisoners Connected With the Recent Conspiracy to Escape—Nevada Irrigationists Hold a State Convention.

LAGRANGE (Or.), Oct. 9.—News has just reached here of a daring robbery which was perpetrated upon the National Bank of Enterprise, in Wallawa County, Wednesday afternoon.

Cashier Holmes was in the bank alone, when a man entered and asked how much money John Smith of Portland had on deposit. Upon the cashier's saying that no such man had any deposit there, the visitor drew a pistol and, covering the cashier, said: "You're a d— liar."

At this juncture two confederates came up on horseback. One of them sitting on his horse, with pistol in each hand, warned the people back; the other entered the bank and poured into a sack all the money on the counter, about \$3,500 in all.

The three men then escaped to the mountains in the direction of Cornucopia. A posse is in hot pursuit, but as the county is sparsely settled the capture of the robbers is a matter of some doubt.

Four thousand dollars in a till under the counter was not found by the robbers.

SAFE-CRACKERS AT RENO.

RENO (Nev.), Oct. 9.—Reno is harboring safe-crackers. They cracked the safe of L. N. Blackless, a retail merchant, last night, and secured for their trouble \$700 in coin and \$500 in notes. There is no clew.

SAN QUENTIN CONSPIRACY.

Preliminary Examination of Sullivan for Complicity in the Affair.
SAN RAFAEL, Oct. 9.—This morning at 10 o'clock the preliminary examination of S. W. Sullivan on a charge of sending and carrying weapons into the State Prison at San Quentin was begun before Justice Duffley.

District Attorney Cochrane and J. N. E. Wilson, who was specially retained by the Prison Directors, appeared for the prosecution, and T. J. Crowley represented the defense.

A few minutes before the hour set for the examination the courtroom was crowded. When the prisoner arrived it was with difficulty that admittance could be gained to the courtroom.

Sullivan appeared calm, not the slightest emotion being betrayed. He took his seat beside his counsel and at once entered into conversation with him.

The woman in black, whose identity is not stated, came in shortly after the prisoner and took her seat near the witness stand. She spoke to her husband, for such Sullivan is, and then sat down and quietly took in the proceedings.
