

THAT LIBRARY BASKET.

The Attorney-General Asks the Grand Jury to Look Into It.

A Legislative Scandal Which He Says Should Be Investigated by the Present Inquisition.

SACRAMENTO, October 13, 1891. To the Hon. A. P. Cattin, Superior Judge Sacramento County, to Frank D. Ryan, Esq., District Attorney, and to the Grand Jury of Sacramento County—GENTLEMEN: At the last session of the Legislature, among other proceedings, the following were had: Concurrent Resolution No. 5, passed by the Senate of the State of California, March 18, 1891, as follows (Journal of the Senate, twenty-ninth session, page 783):

Whereas, Certain documentary evidence, consisting of several papers, and certain memoranda were delivered by certain members of the Senate and Assembly to the Attorney-General on the 14th instant, and enclosed envelopes for safe-keeping and investigation; and whereas, it is claimed that certain of said documentary evidence is important and material as having a bearing upon matters pending before the Legislature, there be it resolved, That a committee of three from each house be appointed, who with the Attorney-General, shall open said envelopes, arrange said documentary evidence so as to make it readable, and report thereon to the houses without delay.

On said day the following amendment to Concurrent Resolution No. 5 was adopted, viz: (Senate Journal, page 794) "And that said Joint Committee shall have power to subpoena and examine witnesses in connection with said papers, and upon the subject-matters therein mentioned."

Thereafter the Joint Committee of the Senate and Assembly made an investigation of said matter, so far as it could within the limited time remaining before the close of the session, and made their report. (The report was published at the time.—Eds.)

On March 25, 1891, a resolution in reference to said investigation was introduced by Senator Preston, and was referred to the standing committee on Judiciary, which committee, on said day, reported the following (Senate Journal, page 945):

SENATE CHAMBER, SACRAMENTO, March 25, 1891. Whereas, The Senate and Assembly did, on the 18th day of March, 1891, adopt a resolution known as Concurrent Resolution No. 5, with the amendments thereto, and the joint committee which was appointed in accordance with the said resolution, has reported to the Senate and Assembly the results of its investigations, and filed with the Lieutenant-Governor the documentary evidence in the case; and whereas, the nature of the evidence is of such a character as to warrant further inquiry, therefore,

Resolved, That the Attorney-General be and that he is hereby requested to cause the evidence and a copy thereof to be presented to the Grand Jury of Sacramento County, with the request that the said Grand Jury make a thorough examination into all the circumstances connected with the case.

Resolved, That the whole subject-matter of the resolution and the committee report be referred to the Attorney-General, to take such action in relation thereto as he may deem proper; and that the Governor be requested to turn over to the Attorney-General, upon request, all his papers pertaining to said matter in his possession, custody or control, and that the Attorney-General be and he is hereby requested to take such action as he may deem advisable.

And we further recommend that said resolution as amended be adopted as a concurrent resolution.

In accordance with the foregoing resolutions and proceedings, I refer the matter to you for such action as may be deemed advisable.

Considerable time has elapsed since the adjournment of the Legislature, but no Grand Jury having been impaneled in this county until now, I have not been able to present the matter before.

During the session of the Legislature, and since, there have been rumors that money had been used to bribe legislators and controlling legislation, in regard to certain measures, among which I may mention:

- 1. The telegraph bill.
2. Colusa-Glenn County division.
3. San Bernardino-Riverside County division.
4. Jacinto County division.
5. The passage of the Dennis Jordan claim.
6. Senatorial contests.

These rumors involve Democratic members of each house, as well as Republicans.

As to the truth of these rumors, I am not able to state. They are of a doubtful nature, and the charges are made so certain and definite that it is the duty of the Grand Jury of Sacramento County, now assembled, to investigate them, and report thereon as impartially as possible. On account of the many capacity newspaper articles, and the desire of the political party not now in power to besmirch the Republican members of the Legislature of California, and the gentlemen who were elected United States Senators at the last session, I deem it the duty of this Grand Jury, for the honor of the State, to investigate these matters fully.

From an examination of the laws passed at the session, with few exceptions, they are found to be as useful legislation as has been since the adoption of the constitution, and the new Constitution. But few bills, subject to objection, were passed.

It is claimed that money was expended in and about the State, and by many of our citizens, and that if bills were passed by one house the opposing side would spend larger sums in order to defeat them in the other. This may or may not be true. The matter should be thoroughly investigated, and if the Grand Jury believes any one is guilty, it is its duty to find indictments, in order that the guilty may be punished. If, on the other hand, these reports are groundless, and no bribery has been committed, you should so find. If any are guilty they should be punished; but if the rumors be false, let it be known, so that the fair fame of California shall in the future be unimpaired.

A republican form of government is founded upon the principle that all power is vested in the people, and that the humblest and poorest of our citizens have the right to aspire to any office within their gift.

Of late years it has been said by people of other States and by many of our citizens, that money and corporations run the politics of this State, and that no honest or poor man could obtain a public office within the gift of the people. Reports having gone out to the people of other States, and believed by many of our own citizens to be true, the guilty should be punished that they may be known that there are still some honest men left among the people and politicians of this fair State of the Pacific Coast.

The young men of the State demand at your hands a fair and full investigation. We cannot expect the young men to take part in its politics, to assist in its government, unless it is carried on honestly and properly.

The old people of this State who aided in putting down the Rebellion and redeeming the National Government, desire the matter investigated, so that they will be satisfied that the politics of California have been renovated, cleansed and purified.

I am aware that this language may be strong, especially as I am a Republican, in connection with the Legislature, the majority of the members of which belong to the same party, but I know that the Republican party is willing and great enough to investigate its own members. I believe it is powerful enough to demand that any one within the party who is guilty of corruption or bribery should be investigated and punished, and if any Republican is guilty of taking a bribe, or selling his vote for money, promise of office or consideration, either political or financial, he should be indicted and punished. If, on the other hand, these

rumors be found false and untrue, let it be so declared, in order that the members of the Legislature, Democratic as well as Republican, shall not live under the odium of being corrupt in reference to the matters about which they legislated.

No honest or guiltless man need be afraid of an investigation of an impartial Grand Jury, and no guilty man has the right to object to your honorable body investigating any corruption which may have taken place in connection with legislative matters.

This investigation may cause considerable expense to the county of Sacramento, but nevertheless the investigation should be had. If Sacramento desires the honor of being the State Capital, she should protect that honor, and make all investigations necessary to maintain the honor and dignity of her name.

I have addressed this communication to the Hon. Superior Judge, for I consider all communications to the Grand Jury should pass through his hands.

I have also addressed this to the District Attorney, for he is the law officer who must direct and control the legal proceedings before the jury. I know him to be an able and efficient man, and I would not be paying him due respect if I ignored him in this report.

In my closing report I have refrained from giving the names of witnesses or persons, except such as appear in the record before the committee, hereinbefore set forth, which were and are public, and might be able to give you information upon subjects referred to. My reasons for doing so are two fold:

1. Should I mention names it might cast reflection upon them which might not be warranted upon the facts.

2. Should I mention the names of the participants, or who might be deemed to be participants, it might be doing them great injustice. They might be looked upon as being guilty, when, in fact, they may not be; and, if guilty, by referring to them here it might give them notice of which they would avail themselves, and depart for other States or Canada.

I shall, however, be pleased to furnish your honorable body, at such reasonable time as you may demand of me, all the information I have.

Let me say, in closing, that the investigation should be had; the people of the State demand it, and if your honorable body does not do so it will have to be done at another time by some other Grand Jury.

The good people of the State of California, both Republicans and Democrats, demand a full, fair and impartial investigation of the matter that the administrations of the State may, in the present and future, be conducted honestly and according to law.

I desire to call your attention to Section 35, of Article IV, of the Constitution, as follows: "Any person who seeks to influence the vote of a member of the Legislature by bribery, promise of reward, intimidation, or any other dishonest means, shall be guilty of bribery, which is hereby declared a felony; and it shall be the duty of the Legislature to provide, by law, for the punishment of this crime. Any member of the Legislature who upon any matter pending before the Legislature by any reward, or promise of future reward, shall be deemed guilty of the crime of bribery, and shall be punished as provided by law, shall be disfranchised, and forever disqualified from holding any office or public trust; any person may be compelled to testify in any lawful investigation or judicial proceeding against any person who may be charged with the crime of bribery, and shall not be permitted to withhold his testimony upon the ground that it may criminate himself or subject him to public infamy; but such testimony shall not afterward be used against him in any judicial proceeding, except for perjury in giving such testimony."

This declares that no witness called before your honorable body has the right to refuse or decline to answer on the ground that he might criminate himself.

The Governor on the 20th ult., before leaving Sacramento, delivered into my possession the papers referred to in the report of the committee. They will be produced at such time as you may direct. Very respectfully submitted.

CONVEYING ELECTRIC POWER.

What Sacramento May Expect in the Near Future.

An Account of the Successful Transmission of Power for One Hundred Miles.

The following letter will be read with deep interest by the people of Sacramento and vicinity, as it indicates what may be expected from the great water-power at Folsom in the near future.

SAN FRANCISCO, October 13, 1891. Eds. RECORD-UNION: So many questions are being asked of this company by residents in Sacramento with reference to the practicality of the water-power available in Sacramento City a portion of the water-power now being created at Folsom, on the American River, twenty miles distant from said city, that we deem it desirable, in the way of a general answer to all such inquiries, and for information to all the people of Sacramento interested in the matter of motive power and light, to bring to your attention the inclosed slip, cut from the New York Tribune, giving a detailed account of the very interesting and most successful transmission of electric power from the water-power at Lauffen, on the Neckar, in Germany, to the city of Frankfurt, a distance of upward of one hundred miles.

We suggest that its publication in your valuable and widely read journal would be the best possible means of answering the before-mentioned interrogatories which are being addressed to this company concerning the future availability of the water-power at Lauffen, and also a matter of great importance to your general readers.

It will be observed that the conditions existing between the power of the Folsom Water-power Company, at Folsom and the city of Sacramento, are vastly more favorable than those existing between the water-power at Lauffen, in Germany, and the city of Frankfurt, where such complete success has just been achieved.

FRANKFURT, Sept. 14.—Probably the most interesting and successful feat of the electrical exhibition here is the great experiment in transmitting power over a long distance. No other feature has attracted so much of the public's attention as this. It was a striking attempt made in this department of electric engineering. Not only all those present, but also the spectators, and mechanical engineers all over the world have watched the progress of the work with intense solicitude. The result has been a triumph. The experiment, which was believed, mark a new era in mechanical science.

What was the problem? To convey the water-power of the Neckar river at Lauffen, Wurttemberg, over a wire to Frankfurt and utilize it there. From Lauffen to Frankfurt is something more than 100 miles. It was therefore proposed to gather power from the Hudson River at Albany, transmit it by telegraph to New York, and there set it to running machinery, making a turbine wheel at Albany run an engine in New York which would in turn connect with the machinery at Frankfurt. The experiment was a success. The engineers went at it in earnest. So did the statesmen, for the line of transmission passed through the territory of three States—Wurttemberg, Baden and Hesse. But the three Governments not only gladly gave permission, but did all in their power to facilitate the work.

Lauffen is an interesting little town, on both sides of the Neckar. There is one picturesque but rather ruinous old bridge across the river. The Neckar is a fine stream of water, in which the place leads all other towns of Europe. A fine system of turbine wheels supply the power. The turbines are of iron, or rather utilizes the power of the Neckar's current. They are placed in a race-way at the side of the river, a mile or so above the town, and are connected by twelve or thirteen feet. The water furnishes about 1,600 horse-power, of which only 900 horse-power is used. The current works have two turbines of 300 horse-power each, making thirty revolutions a minute. A third turbine, of similar action and power, drives an electric dynamo and generator which produces a "multiple-phase" or "rotation" current. This is really a combination of alternating currents. Each of the three components have two turbines of 300 horse-power each, making thirty revolutions a minute. 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
