

A BAD LOT. Women Who Make Their Living by Robbing Men. Charles Curran and R. F. Johnson the Latest Victims--William Gilson's Companions Arrested.

Hardly a night passes that one or more persons do not complain to the police of having been robbed by women, and it would keep busy a larger force of officers than Sacramento possesses in trying to recover the money stolen and secure evidence against the thieves.

A French woman named Marie Flabon, who resides in the disreputable row of houses on the south side of L street, between Third and Fourth, has been arrested and charged with grand larceny, on complaint of a man named Charles Curran.

Two women of lower L street, who travel by the names of May Cooney and Taz Gilbert, were also arrested yesterday on a charge of grand larceny, on complaint of R. T. Johnson, who while standing in a saloon at Second and L streets he was recognized by the women, and before they left him he was just \$10 out of pocket.

William Gilson (otherwise "Chicken") Gilson has sworn to a complaint charging Lizzie Clifton, Kate Pendegast and a woman named Sadie with grand larceny. The woman Sadie, it is said, is an old friend of Gilson's, and he went to her place in the alley between Front and Second, N and O streets, on Tuesday to see her. The other women mentioned were in the house, and a merry time was enjoyed by all.

Upon examination it was thought that the body had been in the water about two weeks. It was that of a man about five feet tall, in height, of smooth face, fair complexion and light hair.

ADULTERANTS IN BAKING POWDER. Ammonia and Alum Are the Principal Adulterants Used. (San Francisco Pacific Medical Journal.) To prove the presence of ammonia in a baking powder, a very simple but quite satisfactory test may be made by not over his own cooking stove. Take a tablespoonful of the powder to be tested and dissolve it in a tablespoonful of water, place the mixture in a glass tumbler, while heating, then introduce your nose into the cup. The resemblance to a bottle of aqua ammonia will, in many instances, be very marked. If the distinct presence of alum would require a more critical analysis.
