PANAMA CANAL.

Negotiations for its Completion Continue at the French Capital.

PARIS, Nov. 17.—The liquidator of the Panama Canal Company, in his report to the Seine Tribunal, says the agreement reached in the negotiations with the United States of Colombia in regard to the canal by Lieutenant Wisye, do not meet the hopes of the liquidator. He trusts, however, the Government of Colombia will accept modifications of the agreement after the new company has been constituted.

THE WORLD'S FAIR.

Interest in the Exposition Increasing in English Provinces.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—In an interview McCormick, the English World's Fair Commissioner, said: "The interest in Great Britain in the exposition is increasing daily and permeating throughout the provinces. This is evidenced by the number of inquiries which I am receiving from manufacturing towns, both direct and through Consular offices of the United States. Sir Henry Wood, Secretary of the Royal Commission, has already received about 100 applications for space, and this number is increasing."

Favor Political Union.

WINSON (Ont.), Nov. 17.—Sol White, the political Union leader, has received a letter from Markham, near Toronto, saying that joint debates were being held there on the subject of political union with the United States and that they are attracting great attention. The letter also says that persons in that vicinity are in favor of such union and are awaiting an opportunity to declare themselves.

British Merchants Very Cautious.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—British merchants are receiving many Brazilian orders for machinery, apparatus, etc., for developing Brazilian industries, but they decline to fill them at present, fearing a further fall in the rate of exchange, although the Brazilians offer to deposit with the Bank of England an ample amount of paper currency as security.

Self-sacrifice for the Starving.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 17.—The soldiers at the Odessa garrison have voluntarily asked that the daily bread ration issued to them be reduced one-third, for the benefit of the starving people in the famine stricken districts. Self-sacrifice for the benefit of the starving is general among all classes, and takes novel forms.

Prince George Doing Well.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—A bulletin issued from Marlborough House this morning, states that Prince George passed a good night. No unfavorable symptoms were developed and unless the Prince should suffer a relapse it is believed his process toward recovery will be rapid.

Proposed Loans in Germany.

BERLIN, Nov. 17.—The Imperial budget for 1892-93 shows an estimated deficit of 139,000,000 marks, which is mainly covered by the proposed loan of 100,000,000 marks for the Military, Naval and Railway Departments, and a supplementary loan for fortifying Heligoland.

Minister Lincoln in Rome.

ROME, Nov. 17.—Robert T. Lincoln, United States Minister to Great Britain, who has been granted leave of absence, has arrived in this city. He expects to remain here for one week.

Under Secretary for India.

LONDON, Nov. 17.—Nathaniel Curzon has been appointed successor to Sir J. E. Gore, as Under Secretary for India.
