ARBITRATION AND WAR.

Admiral Luce of the United States Navy, points out in a recent able essay, that arbitration is not always possible or desirable, as the Peace Society insists.

The great mass of thinking people today favor the arbitration to the war method of the settlement of international disputes, but that does not mean total dissipation by nations of their military forces.

The maintenance of armies, the cultivation of the martial spirit, the equipping of the militia—these do not mean desire for or anticipation of war, as the Peace Congress claims.

Admiral Luce goes beyond our statement, however, and holds that there are cases aside from those cited where arbitration is wholly out of the question, and war an absolute necessity.

RUSSIA AND REBELLION.

There is talk in the press of a possible rebellion in Russia, due to the distress occasioned by the famine, and that hence Russia's only recourse is to engage in a foreign war to divert the attention of the people.

It is possible, certainly, that the Nihilists of Russia may seize the present opportunity to stir up revolt. But the Russians are not a rebellious people. They have proved in the past, despite all provocations, the most loyal of subjects.

There are rumors in the air that indeed are almost as definite as facts, of recent discoveries in electrical science that promise a complete revolution in that realm, and that will reverse one of the best established laws of mechanics.

It is said that the law officers of the Imperial Government of Great Britain and India have decided that the Newfoundland Bait Act is without constitutional warrant, and that a law to prohibit the sale of bait to foreign fishermen cannot stand. This a victory for Canada.

provoked a conflict for these purposes, but we cannot believe either that the Czar fears a rebellion, or that there is probability of uprising that will amount to a rebellion of the order Mr. Abbott anticipates, or which the Government's arm cannot speedily crush.

SAMOA.

There is strife again in Samoa, and Mataafa is in arms against King Malietoa. The cause of the difficulty is said to be the operation of the Berlin treaty, which does not give satisfaction.

The tripartite agreement establishing a Samoan Government, it is claimed, creates insecure offices, and commits too much power to people not in sympathy with the natives.

At the time of the conclusion of the Berlin treaty the impression prevailed that the United States had not been eminently successful in its diplomacy, and that it would turn out that the fine hand of Germany would be felt as the chief power in the islands.

DO WE LOVE MONEY?

The popular belief is that as a people we are not merely money-getters, but money-lovers. Junius Henri Brown, in the North American Review, combats this idea, and insists that we do not love money.

Foreigners, when they come to our shores, are apt to relinquish the custom of hoarding, for liberality is in the air. They cease to be anxious to amass what is to be had on every hand, what is accounted of minor importance.

Now that the Republican effort to secure the session in California of a National political convention has failed, Democratic organs are urging their local party men to strive to secure the National Democratic Convention for this State.
