SACRAMENTO AND THE CITRUS FAIR.

The North and Central District Citrus Fair, authorized to be held by law, will presently be opened at Auburn, in Placer County. It should be made the best, most valuable and attractive of any ever undertaken.

We may not expect a great crowd of Eastern visitors to be present, though at the time a goodly number of strangers will be visiting in the State. But we need more of home education upon all questions of production and the capacities of our soils and climates.

Sacramento County has a special interest in this fair. It is to be held at her very doors, in the territory of our near neighbors, and in the midst of a community with which we have intimate trade relations and social converse.

Sacramento County can place on view oranges, lemons, limes, various semi-tropical plants and growth, olives and olive oil, figs, almonds, walnuts, pomegranates and many other exhibits.

THE ELECTION LAW A SUCCESS. The operation of the reform ballot law in this city yesterday proved the virtue of the system. There was no confusion, no ticket peddling, no old-time rushing up to or crowding about the polls.

Despite all the lugubrious prophecies concerning the intricacies of the law, and the "brain-puzzling" character of "the kangaroo ticket," voters were found to be intelligent enough to understand how to vote, and on emerging from the booths did not bear evidence of having undergone wearying wrestling with their wits.

in the booth who could not read or speak English; that in one instance pencil-marked ballots were counted by the election board. But none of these errors are chargeable to the law. There are no laws that can make men intelligent who will not aid themselves.

The booths were models of compliance with the true purpose of the law. They consisted of light, folding steel frames, covered with cloth, the front being open from the knees of the voter to the floor, so that the elector could not be seen in the act of preparing his ballot, but the public could see that no one was with him in the booth.

The bosses confessed that they could have no assurance of purchased votes being delivered. Ticket peddlers found their vocation gone and were, with the rouser and repeater, the only growlers. Sacramento in March will have another opportunity to test the law, so that when the general election comes on in the fall our people will be able to vote rapidly and without the slightest confusion and in the fullest sense exercise the right of sovereign citizens without hindrance, espionage, interference or any manner of intimidation or cow.


