

KINDERGARTEN BENEFIT.

The ladies promise some rare and novel attractions. There will be a number of beautiful booths where articles will be exhibited for sale, made by devoted workers and admirable for holiday presents.

There will be an auction also, and S. Prentiss Smith has consented to show how a good business man can add a noble work by acting as auctioneer, and a dollar save the cause of benevolence and gratify him who spends it.

There are to be refreshments provided, and an excellent program will entertain the people. Miss Lena Carroll of Oakland, Mrs. A. Elkus, Mrs. A. Bonheim, Miss Bell Martin, Mr. Desmond, C. A. Neale, Robert Tolmie, the distinguished pianist of San Francisco, a pupil of Kallach of Berlin, and an orchestra will fill the musical program.

If the people study the great good work of the kindergartens to all in this city, they must sustain all efforts to aid them of this order. These free kindergartens schools cost less than prisons, they are cheaper than alms; they are the foes of crime, the enemies of poverty and idleness, the promoters of human lives in the paths of peace and usefulness; they neglect and unfortunate children into their care at the very time when the molding of their life's career begins.

There is room here for more such schools, but we must first put beyond possible failure those we have.

JUDGMENT AFFIRMED.

A Placer County Land Case Which Has Some Local Interest.

The Supreme Court yesterday filed its decision in the case of A. Miller, appellant, vs. John B. Hicken, defendant, Milan Johnson and wife, defendants and respondents, and R. Wittenbrock, intervenor and respondent.

The action was brought in Placer county by Miller to foreclose a mortgage executed to him by Hicken on July 1, 1881, to secure a note for \$12,000 and interest, upon a part of a section of land, Johnson and wife were made defendants, as claiming some interest in the land; and they answered averring that on January 11, 1888, Miller had released and discharged said mortgage; that afterward they purchased the land from Hicken, and that they were owners and in possession of the land, unincumbered by the alleged mortgage of Miller.

Wittenbrock intervened, also averring the release and discharge of the mortgage, and alleging further that Johnson purchased from Hicken he gave to the latter, to secure part of the purchase money, the mortgage on land for \$6,200; that afterward he (Wittenbrock) loaned money to Hicken and took Johnson's mortgage as security. He prayed that his mortgage be declared superior to that of Miller (the plaintiff), and that it be foreclosed. Hicken made default.

Miller alleged, in an amended complaint, that the release was made by mistake, and asked to have it reformed. The court found in favor of the intervenor and Johnson and wife, however, that the release was made through mistake. It decreed that the mortgage held by Wittenbrock be foreclosed; that the mortgage on land for \$6,200, that was paid to Johnson, and that Miller take nothing by his action. Miller appealed.

The Supreme Court ordered that the judgment be affirmed.

A GOOD WOMAN GONE.

Death of the Wife of Rev. C. P. Massey of This City.

Mrs. A. D., the wife of Rev. C. P. Massey of this city died yesterday, after a long and painful illness. Mrs. Massey was one of the best known women of the county. She was a member of the directory of the Protestant Orphan Asylum, and an active and devoted worker in the interest of that noble charity.

Mrs. Massey was not only a woman of tireless industry, but was constant in the doing of good to others, and her energy in labors of benevolence scarcely knew limits. She was a merciful, gentle and deeply sympathetic woman, a devoted mother, and a loving wife. Her death is a great loss to the community, and her memory will be long and fondly remembered.

The funeral will be held at 10 o'clock tomorrow from her late residence.
