

FUTURE CITRUS FAIRS.

Would it not be better to hold them in the East?

Director Hancock of the State Board of Agriculture Gives Some Good Advice.

Where should the next citrus fair be held?

This question is being asked every day by citizens who are desirous of seeing our citrus products exhibited, and the capabilities of our soil known, where the most good will result.

One of the best posted men in the State on this subject is G. W. Hancock of this city, one of the Directors of the State Agricultural Society.

"By all means it should be held at Chicago—not at New York, or any other Eastern city. An appropriation of \$200,000 surely ought to be warrant sufficient that the State will make a creditable exhibit of citrus fruits from every section of the State.

"I have just spent a week with the citrus fair at Auburn, and many people are 'doubting Thomases.' There is an army of mossbacks ever ready to shake their heads in wise distrust of orange culture as a business.

"Even the bright, enterprising men who started a citrus colony in Sacramento County showed their faith in their work by planting twenty-five or forty citrus trees around the dooryard plats, and planted a few in the orchards.

"Let me suggest the most potent argument for Eastern people. Let some one who can stand the financial strain plant twenty acres of oranges, take the best of care with the irrigation, fertilization, and in five years they will have a return of from \$200 to \$500 per acre.
