

HARMONY PREVAILS.

Peace Reigns Supreme at the Miners Convention.

PROBABLE SOLUTION OF THE DEBRIS QUESTION.

The Agriculturists Not Opposed to Mining, Provided the Tailings are Not Allowed to Flow Down the Rivers—Congress Memorialized to Construct Restraining Dams—Resolutions Adopted—No Chinese Need Apply.

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 21.—The State Mining Convention assembled at Metropolitan Hall this morning, and began the business of the session.

When the convention was called to order about 10:30 there were fully 1,500 persons present. It was a body of citizens of a character that is seldom seen together in public assemblage. All were substantial, intelligent appearing men.

Immediately on being called to order, the Credentials Committee presented the convention with its report, which was adopted.

On motion, the Board of Supervisors of Placer County were admitted as members of the convention.

The Committee on Memorial presented the following:

To the Honorable Senate and House of Representatives in Congress Assembled: Your memorialists, representing the people of the State of California, in convention assembled at San Francisco for the purpose of considering the question of hydraulic mining and the improvement of the waterways of the State, respectfully represent:

That for many years there has been a conflict between the farming and hydraulic mining interests, the latter being the more active in their operations.

That the mining industry has been a source of wealth and employment to the State, and that the State and Nation are interested in its development.

RESPONSE OF INTEREST TO THE GENERAL PUBLIC. (Under this heading the RECORD-UNION will publish short letters from correspondents on topics of interest to the general public.)

THE AFTERNOON SESSION. When the convention reassembled the Chair announced that some discrepancies had been discovered in the report of the Committee on Memorials, and asked that the report be referred back for correction.

Y. S. McClatchy of Sacramento presented a resolution asking that the convention be held in the city of Sacramento, and that the Chinese be excluded from the city.

On motion of Judge Walling of Nevada this was passed unanimously.

Ex-Lieutenant Governor Johnson was invited to the platform and was applauded as he arose.

A resolution introduced by Price of Butte, thanking T. B. Everett for his services in the convention, was passed unanimously.

Charles G. Yale reported from the Committee on Memorials that in place of the paragraph in the memorial originally presented, and beginning with "A special Board of Engineers was appointed under the provisions," the following be substituted:

We also recommend the appropriation of the sums recommended by Government engineers for improvement of Sacramento, Siskiyou and Feather rivers, and the National Creek. The commercial interests of the State are thereby protected, and the people are benefited.


