

THIRTY YEARS AGO.

Something About the Old-Time Town of Mitchellville.

Another Town That Never Materialized—The Great Flood of '62—McKean Buchanan Up a Tree.

How many persons are there now in Sacramento who remember the "ancient" town of Mitchellville? But there was such a place thirty-odd years ago. It was located on the bank of the American River, about five miles from its mouth and a short distance beyond where Hoboken was situated in 1852.

The town consisted of two saloons, a shanty used as a freight office, a small warehouse. The steamer Sam Soule made two regular trips each day between Sacramento and Mitchellville, carrying a large amount of freight, which was hauled from there to the mines.

Mitchellville presents a rather primitive picture, and the indications are that it will not, for a few years to come, outlive Sacramento, to which it owes its origin.

The town consisted of two saloons, a shanty used as a freight office, a small warehouse. The steamer Sam Soule made two regular trips each day between Sacramento and Mitchellville, carrying a large amount of freight, which was hauled from there to the mines.

On the 22d of January, 1862, the newly-constructed levee at Rabel's tannery, a short distance above the Agricultural Park, gave way and let an additional volume of water from the American River in upon the city.

On the following morning the steamer Gem, Captain Page, left the city with forty tons of freight and a large number of passengers for Patterson's Station, between here and Folsom.

There have been times when the waters of the rivers exceeded in height the floods of 1862, but never has such damage been done as there. In the country between the Stanislaus and San Joaquin rivers the rush of the water was so fierce that fields were stripped of their oak trees.

When the flood of January, 1862, began to subside the bodies of five drowned persons were found one day near H. M. Folsom's place. They were the bodies of a man, a woman and three children.

The serious state of affairs caused by the second flood of January, 1862, on the 21st of that month, did not prevent the newspaper humorist from getting in his work. An item in the Union read:

The barber-shops of the city were all flooded out yesterday, except that of the tinsmith (Chrysopolis), who, for some reason or other, the water failed to reach.

The Government revenue cutter Shubrick visited Sacramento in the latter part of January, 1862. She made a trip out over the Yolo ocean that rolled at that time over the country west of this city, and rescued the families of many farmers whose homes had been partially submerged.

On the 9th of February, 1862, the steamer Nevada, while on her way to San Francisco, sprang a leak and was run ashore about a mile this side of Rio Vista, where she partially sank. The Chrysopolis took off her two hundred passengers and mails.

On the 26th of January Mike Brannigan, the notorious blackguard, was sentenced by Judge Robinson to ten years in the State Prison for a criminal assault upon Edith Mitchell, the actress, who had accepted an invitation to ride in one of his carriages.

"New Sacramento" was the name given by Samuel Norris to a new town laid out by him on the high ground west of the American River. The site is there yet, but the town never materialized.
