

THE GREAT VISITATION. The Most Notable Event of Years for California.

The Part Sacramento Is to Have in It—Preparations Set on Foot—Interesting Details.

There has been projected no visitation to California as all comparable in importance with that about to take place, that promises so much, or that has had any such encouragement from the great transportation companies, which are quick to see any pecuniary advantage in the coming of a properly constituted body of Eastern visitors.

THE BEGINNING. In January we announced the departure of a committee of the California Press Association for Cincinnati, to urge the National Editorial Association to come to California.

THE PREPARATIONS. The next step was to prepare the way, and a meeting of representatives of the Southern California Editorial Association and the California Press Association, the State Board of Trade and the San Francisco Chamber of Commerce, was held in February.

WHO THE VISITORS ARE. Before reciting what the local reception is to be, it will be well to state who the visitors are. The National Editorial Association is composed of newspaper and magazine and review proprietors and writers in thirty-six States of the Union, representing a total population of one hundred and thirty million people.

THE PROPRIETORS AND WRITERS. The proprietors and writers are those known and respected in their communities, whose journals are dependent upon local support in the main, and whose papers are fair exponents of community sentiment, progress and condition.

WHO COMES. It is estimated that of these, not less than 600, and probably 800, will come to the California Exposition in May, 1892, and their transportation being so favorable and the expense account being reduced to such a nominal figure as to induce a very large number to attend.

A MILLION DOLLARS. Nor indeed for the last of April, at their homes, each with a volume edited by S. S. Boynton of Denville, containing sketches of every county and town, printed in the California Press Association.

THE LOCAL SKETCHES. Will be simple, accurate statements of fact, without any exaggeration, or any recital that cannot be verified. Each article is now being prepared by the men of the press of every county and town in this county.

A SWEEPING VISIT. The tour of the guests will be one never equalled—it takes in the whole State except the timber regions. Thus, it begins at San Diego, taking in all the railroads and sections of Southern California, and all the leading towns and cities; then the guests come to the Sacramento Valley, visiting Fresno and Stockton.

THE SACRAMENTO RECEPTION. The idea of the local committee of the California Press Association as to Sacramento's reception is, in rough outline, about this: The several trains will arrive here at 1 o'clock, May 20th, and remain here all the afternoon and all night.

WHERE THEY WILL GO. They will be shown the residence sections, visit the Capitol, Art Gallery and other points, and then be left to their own devices for two hours. They will on no occasion be molested or talked to, and at 6 o'clock will assemble and take supper with Sacramento; a plain, substantial, wholesome, bonafide supper.

As the party is so large it will be impossible to take them all into the country, and they will see the country on the south and east when coming from Galt. About 200 will be asked to take a special train at about 2:30 and ride to Folsom, passing through the fruit lands along the American River and the Natoma Vineyard.
