

MUNICIPAL PLUMS.

Regular Distribution by the Board of Trustees Yesterday.

Remaining the Water Works—The Mayor Makes a Characteristic Speech.

The fact that yesterday was the day for the annual distribution of the various municipal plums within the giving of the Board of Trustees attracted a large crowd to the City Hall.

The Mayor made a speech. He did not exactly address his colleagues nor did he speak to the audience. He rather talked into space.

When the minutes had been read, the Mayor announced that the reading of petitions for offices was in order. There were only two of them.

Mr. C. Bond, ex-County Surveyor, was named by Green for the office of City Engineer, and was unanimously elected.

Mr. Green nominated George W. Nichols, and he was unanimously elected. Mr. Conklin nominated Roland A. Renwick for Chief Engineer of the Water Works, and there being no other candidates, the nominee was elected.

There were two candidates for Second Engineer of the Water Works, Frank Daroux and Joseph Judd, who was Chief Engineer last year.

There was a unanimous vote for John Watt (incumbent) for City Tapper, and Samuel Blair was unanimously re-elected as his assistant.

A. J. McCormack, an ex-policeman, was elected engineer of the Y-street pump by the votes of Green and Constock. John Whitehall received the vote of Conklin.

J. McGraw, whose name was presented by Green, was unanimously elected Captain of the chaingang.

The selection of Poundmaster and City Scavenger was laid over until next week. The only other business transacted by the board was to receive the report of the Chief Engineer of the Water Works for the week ending March 27th.

WHAT'S IN A NAME? The Supreme Court Decides that "Rose" Means "Rosa."

A Supreme Court decision in the case of G. Galliano vs. Rosa Kilroy (appellant), was filed in Deputy Clerk Govan's office yesterday.

This was an action to repeal two certain mortgages upon real property. A judgment by default was entered against all the defendants, from which Rosa Kilroy appealed.

Pending this action a supplemental complaint was filed, asking judgment under certain covenants contained in the mortgages for moneys paid out for the insurance of the property.

Galliano gave appellant written notice, which was attached to a copy of the supplemental complaint, that upon a certain day he would ask leave of the court to file such complaint.

On the Ground of Cruelty. The divorce case of Mrs. Rose J. Nugent vs. John J. Nugent was heard before Superior Judge Van Fleet yesterday.

A VERY BLUE MONDAY.

The Unfortunates for Whom Judge Cravens Prescribed.

A Strong Array of Sunday Drunks and Peace Disturbers—Freddie Viskers to Go to Whittier.

Tim Hodge was the first to apologize to Judge Cravens yesterday morning for being a few degrees drunker than the law allows.

John Leonard also pleaded guilty to being drunk, and submitted his pension certificate as a recommendation to the court. The Judge thought Leonard ought to be looked after until he had secured his pension for the ensuing quarter, and that he would be safest in the City Jail for the next few days.

John Dougherty arrived from Virginia City recently, but succeeded in getting drunk without much delay. He had spent all his money, but thought, if the court would let him proceed, that he could walk back to Virginia City, and offer to go right away.

James Turner and James Murphy were charged with disturbing the peace. Turner pleaded guilty without a plea, but Murphy pleaded not guilty.

Officer Lowell testified that he arrested the two men at the corner of Third and K streets. Considerable saloon brawling struck at Turner, but only succeeded in punching his fist through a glass door.

Murphy said he was standing quietly at the corner when Turner, whom he did not know, came and struck him in the breast. He did the best he could to return the blow, but missed his opponent and struck the glass. His hand was decorated with a bandage.

Turner testified, in a modest way, that he was so full he did not know what had come over him. The case was continued until this morning to hear the testimony of another witness.

LITTLE FREDDIE VISKERS. The case of Freddie Viskers came up for judgment, Freddie having pleaded guilty to the theft of a pocket-knife from a playmate.

Freddie's father came forward and testified that the boy was unmanageable and would not stay at home, but came and went as he pleased. The father worked in the railroad shops and the boy's mother was an invalid.

Judge Cravens said the boy had given both his predecessor and himself trouble by his frequent absences from school, and he thought the best thing that could be done was to give him a chance to be disciplined. He therefore ordered him committed to the Whittier Reformatory School for the period of four years.
