

THE NEW CHIEF OF POLICE.

John B. Rodgers Duly Installed in His Office.

Ex-Chief Drew Says He Will Contest the Election of a New Force—New Police Detail—Etc.

The city has a Chief of Police, and his name is John B. Rodgers, and he has taken up his quarters in the police station.

It is true W. F. Drew, the ex-Chief, did as he had announced he would do, refuse to vacate the office without protest.

There was a large crowd of people in and about the police station at an early hour in the morning. Some were waiting for their own election as members of the police force.

Something did happen, as above stated, but that was simply in the natural order of things.

Ex-Chief Drew was down bright and early, and had a good chance for one, to find out what the city jail smelled like at about sunrise.

Addressing the Commissioners, Drew said: "I still insist that I am Chief of Police of Sacramento, and that as such, I am entitled to sit with you as a member of this board."

Mr. Devlin told the board that all it could do was to recognize Rodgers as chief. The question which Drew's protest was based was, he said, a matter of law for the courts to determine.

Mr. Jones states that he will at once begin suit in the Superior Court to oust Rodgers, on the ground that he is not a citizen, and therefore ineligible to hold the office.

The Police Commissioners met at 2 o'clock, Mayor Constock presiding. The Police Courtroom was crowded with applicants for positions as policemen.
