

SACRAMENTO'S PROPOSED EXHIBIT.

Level-Headed Citizens Who Want to See a Good One.

Farmer McConnell, Who Raises Sheep, Protests Against the Use of the Public Money.

A called meeting of the Executive Committee of the County World's Fair Association was held at the Courthouse yesterday.

Colonel James McNasser and Mrs. Kerr were chosen as Vice-Presidents. On motion of Mr. Carroll, C. H. Cummings was elected Treasurer.

Chairman Bates said he thought the first thing in order would be to ascertain as nearly as possible what would be the expense of making a creditable county exhibit.

Mr. Carroll thought the coming World's Fair would be the grandest opportunity for the State to be represented by its products.

Mrs. Kerr spoke in the gentlemen's name by declaring that, in her opinion, this was no time for Sacramento County to be pennywise and pound foolish.

Mr. Carroll said that the only way to make Haggis and the other large landowners referred to by Mr. McConnell pay their share of the exhibit, was to tax them by paying the money out of the general fund, as provided for by the Legislature.

Superior made extended remarks, the purpose of which was to show that Sacramento would make a great mistake if she neglected the opportunity offered in which to make a fair exhibit of her products and resources.

Mr. Lubin made a vigorous reply to Mr. McConnell. He argued that if Sacramento County desired to be represented at the World's Fair, her people must prepare that exhibit.

Mr. Haggis said that he did not regard this as a land-peddling proposition. The Nation is going to hold a World's Fair, and it should be a credit to the Nation.

He was sorry that Sacramento County fell just a little short of the requisite population to enable her to appropriate \$40,000 for an exhibit.

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, SACRAMENTO, April 11, 1892.
