EARTHQUAKE EVENTS AND SENSATIONALISM. The disposition to make the recent disturbances of the crust of the earth sensational in news articles is neither enterprising nor beneficent.

It is always a sign of weakness when a disputant, driven from one post to another, has at last no other reply to make than the response of the sneer.

San Francisco Bulletin, unable to answer the charges of the interior against the purpose of the metropolis, resorts to the sneer, and pronounces the argument advanced concerning the unit of transportation to be pointless, and the belief that San Francisco means to insist upon a unit of five or ten carload lots, to be a bugbear.

The Record-Union gives rein to its imagination in this matter. The Record-Union imagines nothing regarding the effort of the metropolis to absorb all the business of distribution; it has indubitable evidences of all it asserts in that regard.

San Francisco's whole contention is for the purpose of securing such rate discrimination in her favor that the interior will be compelled to take its chief supplies out of that city.

The contention of the interior is that between the producer and the metropolitan merchant importing element there is not and cannot be any community of interest; that San Francisco having lost the trade north and south of her by reason of her own want of energy and because new lines of transportation have been opened up, creating supply stations independently of her, she should turn her attention, not to peddling to the interior, or to efforts to rob the latter of its terminal privileges, but to commanding trade between her port and distant points, as has done the true merchant class in other great cities, whose commercial horizon is limitless.

To disclaim intention to injure and yet to continue efforts that, if successful, can have no other effect than the breaking down of interior trade and the creation of a monopoly of distribution for San Francisco, is not to convince the inland towns and cities that San Francisco has any higher motive prompting her than the enlargement of her profits irrespective of cost of supplies to the consumers.


