SECRET BUSINESS SESSION OF THE GRAND PARLOR.

Sacramento Selected as the Next Meeting Place—Age of Candidates Admitted to the Order.

Special to the RECORD-UNION. LOS ANGELES, April 26.—The Grand Parlor, N. S. G. W., were in secret business session during the entire day. The Grand Parlor refused to change the law regarding the election of grand officers, from the last day of the session to the fourth day.

The question of electing Grand Trustees by districts called forth a long and earnest debate. The committee on Legislation recommended the revision of an amendment to hold future sessions of the Grand Parlor in San Francisco. Carried.

The committee on Laws and Supervision recommended the abandonment of the plan whereby each parlor has to be notified of the admission of a stranger to a parlor. The report of the committee was rejected, and the change reading "the name of the brother bringing charges shall be revealed only to the President, Secretary and committee," was stricken out.

The committee reported adversely on the proposition to allow brothers to be transacted at a special meeting, other than for which it was called. The amendment called for the transaction of other business at a special meeting by unanimous consent of the members present. The report of the committee was agreed to, and the section removed.

Regarding the fixing of the initiation fee a sun not greater than \$25, the grand parlor concluded that subordinate parlor should be the best judges of their own affairs, provided that the minimum fee shall not be less than \$5.

Before adjournment of the morning session Grand Past President Frank D. Ryan presented a resolution empowering the Board of Grand Trustees to purchase a Senior Past President's badge for H. Clay Chipman of Sacramento. The resolution was adopted.

At the afternoon session Sacramento was agreed upon as the place for holding the next Grand Parlor.

At the evening session the Committee on Appeals and Grievances submitted a report, in nearly every case sustaining the decisions given by the President.

The question of allowing persons having Indian blood in their veins to join the order, which had been decided negatively by the Committee on Grievances, came up, and it was decided to refer the matter in the hands of subordinate parlor.

To-morrow the delegates and friends will take an excursion over the kite-shaped track of the Santa Fe, and in the evening the local Native Daughters will tender a reception to the delegates in Turn Verein Hall.

The Museum Association Receives an Alligator from a Showman.

C. T. Hill of California, Mo., walked into the Art Gallery yesterday and presented to Custodian Jackson, for the California Museum Association's natural history collection, a horned toad, in one box, and in another a live alligator.

The horned toad was no novelty, but in the Sacramento Valley the alligator was. Mr. Hill claims to have found the creature near Riverside, San Bernardino County, but how he captured it was not explained.

However that may be, the Museum Association has the alligator. Yesterday when the directors met, a customer who opened the box to show them the donation, and the little rascal, now about twelve inches long, scrambled out and scampered off between the legs of some of the members, who joined in a hot chase for it. It was finally overhauled by one of the members who got a tail hold, while another held the captive back in his box with a ruler.

The directors ordered a castaway alligator to be fitted up and provided with water, moss, etc. as a home for the living saurian, in the hope to grow him to sufficient size to be worth the trouble of converting his hide into shoe leather. In the meantime curiosity seekers can examine the creature at leisure.

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AWAITING DEVELOPMENT.

A Territory Capable of Supporting Fifty Million People.

The arid region of the United States covers an area of 1,500 miles in its widest part, from east to west, and 1,000 miles from north to south. It embraces the area between the 10th meridian and the Coast Range, and from the British possessions on the north to Mexico on the south. This space contains over a million of square miles—one-third of the area of the United States, excluding Alaska—equal to more than 600,000,000 acres.

All of Arizona, New Mexico, Utah, Wyoming, Idaho and Colorado, and portions of California, Oregon, Washington, Texas, Kansas, Nevada, North and South Dakota and Montana lie within this belt. It is estimated in the report for the year ending June 30, 1891, of the Hon. John Noble, Secretary of the Interior, that "120,000,000 acres that are now desert may be reclaimed by irrigation so as to produce the cereals, fruits and grain products possible in the climate where the lands are located."

When it is remembered that 120,000,000 acres about equal in area the States of Ohio, Indiana and Illinois combined, the gigantic possibilities and future of so great an extent of fertile and productive land now lying fallow, may be imagined when it is made to "laugh with a harvest." The four States above named now have a population of about 15,000,000, and could easily support twice that number; so that estimating the cultivable area of the arid region at 120,000,000 acres, and doubling it greatly exceeds that amount, the United States has in that desert land an empire awaiting development, capable of supporting a population in comfort and plenty equal to the now existing population of the entire republic.
