THE TROUBLE WITH THE METROPOLIS.

The San Francisco News Letter undertakes to answer the question, "Why do not the merchants of San Francisco capture the trade of the ocean that lies invitingly near?"

Our critical contemporary then proceeds to point out the cause of the loss of trade to the metropolis on the north and the south, by systems that annex those sections to the Eastern markets, and the causes that conspire to deprive California of the Central and South American trade.

The News Letter insists, and there can be made no successful denial of the fact, that there is to be named no point of equal importance to that of San Francisco that has to-day so few steamship lines to be credited to that city.

The case of Melbourne is then cited, which has been elaborated in the RECORD-UNION, and it is asked why there should be such a radical difference between the commerce of the two cities?

Here we have Mr. Leeds, the hired manager of the Traffic Association that is doing its utmost to use the interior press to rake out chestnuts for San Francisco, who issues a manifesto in which he assumes to map out political action for the people of a State of which he is not a citizen, and the sole purpose of which is to make the interior an involuntary

tribute-payer to metropolitan incompetency to do commercial business.

Mr. Leeds bids the Traffic Association enter politics, capture the Legislature, propose, submit and adopt constitutional amendments abolishing the Railroad Commission, and relegate the whole question of freights and fares to the seething legislative boil.

There is to be, apparently, an independent citizens' movement in San Francisco; the Bulletin and Call will lead it; the Traffic Association will give it comfort and cohort with it.

What has the Democratic party, which is next week to hold its convention, to gain by taking up Mr. Leeds' fight? What sort of succor does it expect to receive from the Bulletin that never yet discovered a Democratic virtue?

The plea is that the Traffic Association cannot wait to take the usual and proper course of protesting complaint of unjust exactions by the railroad; yet if Mr. Leeds, the Bulletin, the Call, Mr. Burns and the Traffic Association know anything, they know that they cannot bring about constitutional resolution and a legislative crusade upon railway rates in an hour less than three years.


