THE CHARTER ELECTION.

The citizens of Sacramento will to-day
be called upon to perform one of the most
important duties that by self-government
men impose upon themselves—they are
to enact a peaceful and beneficent revolution
if they elect to adopt the new charter.

The RECORD-UNION has discussed this
charter question dispassionately, but
earnestly, without bias or any manner of
prejudice. We have treated it as a legal
document, a political foundation, a community
compact; it has compared it calmly, provision
by provision, with the existing and many
other charters, and its judgment is that no
one will suffer in any respect by its acceptance
at the ballot box.

But this said, we wish once more before
the polls open to challenge every citizen
to his duty to-day. He who remains away
from the polls without physical good excuse
evades a duty that every claim and privilege
of citizenship puts upon him.

The proposition to admit Utah to the
privilege of choosing her own governing
officials is simply a proposition to give
polygamous Mormonism new life, to revive
and rehabilitate all that has been antagonistic
to good government in the theory and practice
of Utah Mormonism.

It would, if conceded by Congress, make
Utah, for all practical purposes, a State
without a Constitution while still remaining
a Territory. It is a bad scheme and will not
do.

MODERN ARMAMENTS.

Changes Made in Death-Dealing
Weapons Lately.
The notable features in the changes of
the armaments are the innovations in the
making of small arms, cannon and death-
dealing weapons in general.

It gives us a Mayor with power to
enforce the laws and compel subordinates
to do their duty.

6. It takes from the people the election
of no officer that is the true head of a
department; but it does give jointly to the
legislature and executive the appointment
of subordinates in certain departments;
as, for instance, to the Board of Education,
the selection of its Clerk and Superintendent
of Schools, with power of removal; to the
Mayor and Trustees, the election of Chief
of Police; Superintendent of Streets, Chief
Engineer and other subordinates.

7. It does away with two or three
commissions, and puts the regulating power
and responsibility into the board that
levies the taxes and determines their volume,
thus escaping from the friction of the
present between boards and commissions
that contend each for its independence,
and demand of the tax-levying power
that it shall respond to their demands
for financial supplies whether it likes it or not.

8. It abandons the Police Judgeship
and puts a Justice of the Peace upon the
bench, whom the people now have to pay
whether he works or not, and thus it
conserves economy.

9. It gives us a revenue system under
which taxes can be collected, and that
will remove the reproach that now attaches
to the city, to wit: that the city officials
cannot compel any man to pay his taxes,
so defective is the present charter.

10. In the aggregate sum the salaries
under the new charter are materially less
than under the present one.

11. It gives the police force permanency,
makes the tenure of office on the force
depend upon fitness and diligence, and
frees the officers from political assessment

and boss domination. It gives us an
auxiliary police force at small cost, that
serves much as extramural do in the Fire
Department; that is, they can follow
other occupations, though all the while
on duty. This auxiliary force costs very
little, but being liable at any moment to
respond to a general call and constantly
on duty is material help.

12. It gives a greater number of wards
and thus eases the machinery of government
and makes the Board of Trustees more
representative.

13. It gives the legislative arm power
to establish a labor employment bureau;
to maintain a Morgue; to work a chain-gang;
to regulate markets; to grant franchises
to street railways to the highest bidder;
to employ legal counsel by the year at
an economic salary, thus saving thousands
of dollars to the taxpayers annually paid
for special legal service.

14. It limits city expenditure and tax
and puts into contracts nearly all the
schedule of outlay for service or supplies
to the city, and requires that they be let
only after ample public notice; it holds
every legislative official personally
liable for every dollar of debt or liability
contracted in violation of the express
provisions of the charter.

15. While it fixes the salaries of round-men
of the police force at \$90 a month,
power is expressly reserved in the Trust-
tees to increase that amount by ordinance
(see section 207) whenever that body finds
it wise to do so.

There are still other reasons for the
adoption of the charter, but these are the
chief and sufficient, in our opinion, to
commend it fully to the voters of the city.
Those who entertain the fear that the
adoption of the charter will affect and
paralyze the Funded Debt Commission
have but to vote for alternative proposition
No. 1, which incorporates the whole
scheme of the commission into the charter
and gives that commission life and
vitality by constitutionally legalizing the
Act of 1889, that attempted to authorize
it to expend in excess of 25 cents for the
purchase of city indebtedness. Those
who believe the commission scheme
ought to be abandoned have but to vote
for alternative proposition No. 2.

THE BICYCLE NOISANCE.

A bicycle dealer appeared before the
Board of Trustees yesterday and urged
the board not to adopt the proposed ordinance
extending protection against bicy-
cle riders to all sidewalks west of Twen-
tieth street. He argued that if the present
ordinance, making it unlawful to ride
bicycles on the sidewalks between 1 and
L, and west of Tenth street, was enforced,
the people would be satisfied. He is
very much mistaken. The people living
on G, H, M, N or P streets have as much
right to protection against the murderous
wheel as those who happen to live
on J, K or L. Women and children
have been run down and crippled on
almost every street named, by
reckless riders, and it is time a
stop was put to it. The Board of Trust-
ees will not be doing its duty unless it
passes an ordinance which will protect
the people of the whole city from this
dangerous nuisance.

The objection raised to the proposed
ordinance in its present form, that it
would prevent little children from riding
their tricycles on the pavements in front
of their homes, has strength, but the
proposed ordinance can be amended so as
to make the proper distinction.

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GORED BY A BULL!

Charles Boomar Seriously Injured by
a Vicious Animal.
Charles Boomar, an employe at the East
Park Dairy, undertook to drive a band of
cattle from the vicinity of Twenty-eighth
and F streets on Sunday to a corral. A
bull in the band, that has been showing
an ugly disposition of late, refused to be
driven and finally attacked Boomar,
threw him down and gored him seriously.

Two men by the names of Pearson and
Wardell went to Boomar's assistance, and
after belaboring the furious animal for
some time drove him away.

Boomar was carried to the dairy and
a physician summoned. He was found
to be seriously wounded about the head
and several stitches were taken in his
scalp. Unless injured internally his
wounds are not dangerous.

Had it not been for the prompt rescue
the bull would doubtless have killed his
victim.




