That the office of District Deputy Grand President be abolished, and that Past Presidents by seniority install the officers of subordinate parlors.

That the Grand Officers constitute a Visiting Board, as formerly.

That candidates unable to pass a successful medical examination be admitted as social members, but exempt from sick benefits.

That any member desiring to become a member of a parlor must reside in the vicinity six months.

That the term of the office of Financial Secretary be extended to one year, instead of six months.

That the office of Grand Lecturer be created by the Grand Parlor.

That the per capita tax be reduced.
