

RUNS AND PUT-OUTS.

Warm Weather for Baseball, But Lots of Running.

The Scott & Gilberts Again Warm the Jackets of the Gentlemen From San Joaquin.

The second game of the Valley Baseball League was played at Agricultural Park yesterday by the Scott & Gilberts and the Stocktons, before a good-sized audience, who got their money's worth out of it in the way of baseball.

Owing to the heat it was almost impossible for the pitchers to do good work, consequently base hits were plentiful. Hapeman was touched up for eighteen hits, with a total of twenty-four bases, while the Stockton pitchers were put down for fourteen hits, with a total of sixteen bases.

Hapeman struck out twelve batsmen, but allowed hits to be bunched together in times. Both teams put up poor fielding games, which was in great contrast to their fine work of the preceding week.

Bigelow's errors were overthrown to second base to catch runners snapping Stafford and Walters played a fine game at short field, and the batting of the latter was very hard. His home run was a clean drive to center field.

The game, notwithstanding the large score, was closely contested, and was not decided until the last man was out in the ninth inning.

In the first inning the home team scored twice, on Dougherty's single and Stafford's three-bagger. The visitors scored one in their half by clean hitting.

In the second inning the home team took the lead by scoring five runs after two men were out.

The Slough City lads added two to their score in the second, and one in the third inning, and took the lead in the fifth by some clever hitting, aided by errors.

The home team tied the score in the sixth. In the seventh the visitors took the lead by one, but in the last half the home team took a lead of two runs, which they maintained to the end, winning by a score of 13 to 11.

In the last inning the visitors scored one run, and had two men on bases, but they were retired by clean hitting.

William Guth umpired the game to the satisfaction of both sides, his judgment on balls and strikes being unusually good.

FIELD TRIAL ENTRIES.

The List Increasing With Each Succeding Year.

Forty-seven Youthful Canines Entered for the Pacific Coast Puppy Stake in January.

From the sportsman's standpoint, the little meeting that took place at the Golden Eagle Hotel in this city ten years ago—which resulted in the formation of the Pacific Coast Field Trial Club—has produced great results. Up to that time but little care had been taken in the breeding and training of setters and pointers, and there was no recognized standard of excellence, or, rather, there were too many standards, for each owner of a bird dog had his own—his dog, of course, being the best in the State.

Now, however, all this is changed, and through the medium of the Field Trial Club, every sportsman of the present day takes a decided interest in having for his hunting companion a setter or pointer that can do creditable work in the field. The field trials have educated them up to it; and nowadays when a man thinks of purchasing a hunting dog he is as particular about its pedigree as a horse-breeder would be about the lineage of his brood animals.

While this idea may sometimes be carried to absurd extremes, still as a rule it is the safer course to pursue if a man wants an animal in which the hunting instinct is so strong as to be almost irresistible. There are now a large number of breeding kennels in this State, both of pointers and setters, and some of them contain the best blood to be found in this country or in England.

The great success of last January's field trials at Bakersfield, together with the splendid prospect for the meeting next January, have caused a larger number of entries for the derby, or puppy stake, than ever before. These entries closed last week, and are forty-seven in number.

The all-stage stake, which should be fifteen starters it will amount to \$225 more. Then there is \$125 to be added by the citizens of Bakersfield (who give \$250 to the two stakes at the age and the derby), making \$350 to be divided between the owners of the dogs gaining first, second and third places, and of which the winner will receive one-half, or nearly \$300.
